

CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

As we celebrate our 40th Rockland County Sports Hall of Fame induction gala, it's time to reflect on all the athletic greats who have been recognized and honored by our organization. Our inaugural committee members had the foresight to establish a sports hall of fame to honor athletic excellence. Among them were founder Joe Holland, Charles Brownsell, Shirley Sweetman and Jim Kane, a charter member who is still active on our board and continues to provide guidance and support. They and other contributors understood how important sports were to Rockland County's social and cultural history. Sports in Rockland have changed from a time when all



County teams would play each other within the confines of our geographic borders, irrespective of class size. Local newspapers, of which there were several, would devote extensive coverage to sports and rivalries. Title IX was not yet legislated. Some would say the golden era of sports was the 1930s to the 1960s when Bud Kast was scoring touchdowns for Pearl River in the late 30s and Tappan Zee was knocking out championships under coach Nick Mottola with players like Mike Rotundo in the 1950s. The Deer Head softball tournament, run by Vic Alfieri Sr. and Vic Jr. along with Ernie Capobianco, epitomized a sports camaraderie and tradition from 1966 to 1996. Deer Head softball tournaments were an institution unto themselves, bringing together the best softball players from the County and region. It's a piece of that sports history that I wish can be resurrected.

Ed Wanamaker of Nyack, who excelled in soccer and baseball, would have played in the later stages of the golden era and on into the start of the modern era. The modern era is highlighted in this year's induction ceremony by the likes of Gary Gray, who set a standard of winning 432 basketball games at Nyack, and Keith Bulluck, who was an athletic standout for Clarkstown North and who went on to become an All-Pro linebacker for the Titans. Several years ago when I first started playing fantasy football I picked Bulluck as a defensive player. He provided me with a number of points based on his performance – that was sort of cool. To round out our induction class we selected Jodi Schlesinger Salsberg for her exploits in track and field for Clarkstown South and Khyl Farrison for his three-sport excellence at Suffern. The Rockland County sports world should be extremely proud of the quality of athletes who continue to compete at high levels in spite of the pressures to maintain academic standards. These athletes now must compete for scholarships that are harder to come by in a highly competitive global economy.

In the past year we experienced the passing of Ethel Doller, a good friend and longtime member of our organization. Last year we honored Ethel with a special plaque for her dedicated 33-year service to the Rockland County Sports Hall of Fame. Mike Longuil, Rocco Marano and George Garrecht, all previous inductees of our hall of fame, passed away during the last year. They will all be missed.

ENSHRINEMENT REQUIREMENTS

The Rockland County Sports Hall of Fame was established to honor outstanding sportsmen and sportswomen, living and deceased, who have gained prominence while residing or competing in, or have brought recognition to Rockland County. To be considered for nomination to the Hall of Fame, candidates must meet the following criteria:

- A. Attain prominence in sports as an athlete, coach, manager, official, owner, writer, broadcaster or supporter.
- B. Reside or have resided in Rockland County, competed here at the time of their prominence, or brought fame to Rockland County as a result of their accomplishments.
- C.Be a person of integrity and good character.
- D. Candidates cannot be considered until 10 years after their high school class graduation, except in special cases.

Our committee encourages the public to send athletic resumes/nominations of prospective candidates to Screening Committee chairman Bob Veltidi, 400 Jersey Avenue, Greenwood Lake, NY 10925. Nominees are reviewed by this committee and, if accepted, voted upon for enshrinement by the committee as a whole.

The Hall of Fame Committee holds monthly meetings the first Tuesday of the month from October to May. Anyone wishing to join the organization should write to Chairman Pete Scheibner, 1 Captain McGovern Drive, Stony Point, N.Y. 10980, or e-mail him at scheibnp@msn.com.

Each inductee in the Rockland County Sports Hall of Fame receives a commemorative trophy and is further honored with an individual plaque, which is given to the inductee's high school for public display.

The Rockland County Sports Hall of Fame is more than awards and trophies and dinners, however. It is really about people – Rockland County people who have had an impact in the world of sports. A total of 231 such individuals have been honored since the hall's inception in 1974.

The Hall of Fame has evolved from those early beginnings to become a recognized presence in Rockland County athletics. In addition to its annual dinner, where it honors new inductees, the hall makes sizable donations to worthwhile local organizations and charities. Included among these donations have been cash gifts to:

KEITH BULLUCK

Clarkstown North High School Class of 1995


When Keith Bulluck roamed the football fields of Rockland County, he struck fear into the minds of the opposing coaches. They knew he was going to be involved in every play for Clarkstown North but they just didn't know how to stop him. On offense Keith played running back, wide receiver, and at times quarterback; it all depended upon where he would do the most damage. He also returned all kicks for the Rams while leading the team on defense from his linebacker position. In Keith's senior year, 1994, Clarkstown North finished 8-1 with their lone loss coming at the hands of perennial champion North Rockland. For his efforts on the football field Keith was selected first team All-County, first team All-Section 1, and first team All-New York State. Keith was also selected Blue-Chip All American by both Prep Football Report and Super Prep All-Northeast. In addition, Keith played basketball for Clarkstown North under Rockland Hall of Famer Coach Paul Toscano and he was voted to the All-County first team. On April 27, 2009, Keith's high school jersey, No. 1, was retired in a ceremony held at the high school. He also has a name plaque at Clarkstown North High School hung up in their Hall of Fame display.

After being recruited by many Division I schools, Keith decided upon Syrcause University to further his education and career in football. Keith started out as a safety his freshman year, but, as he matured and grew, the coaching staff switched him to linebacker. In his sophomore year, 1996, Keith became the starting linebacker for the Orangemen, a position he never relinquished until he graduated. With Keith as a three-year starter for Syracuse, the Orangemen won the Big East Championship every year. In Keith's senior year he was voted first team All-Big East. That year he led the Big East in tackles with 138 and received the Bill Horr Award, which is given to Syracuse's most valuable player, quite an accomplishment considering Donovan McNabb was on that team. He finished his career with 375 tackles, six sacks, three interceptions, three forced fumbles and six fumble recoveries.

Keith was drafted by the Tennessee Titans as the 30th overall pick in the 2000 National Football League draft. After spending his first two seasons as a backup and special teamer, Keith became a starter in 2002. The following year, 2003, Keith was voted as a starter in the Pro Bowl and went on to lead the Titans in tackles five times. In 2004 he led the NFL in tackles with 152, and in 2007 Keith recorded a Titans linebacker record five interceptions. Keith was voted to the Pro Bowl on two other occasions and was nominated by the Titans as the Walter Payton Man of the Year twice, in 2006 and 2007. The Walter

Payton Man of the Year award is given annually by the NFL honoring a player's volunteer and charity work, as well as his excellence on the field.

Keith's upbringing as a foster child from ages 12 to 18 led him to work with foster kids and underprivileged youth.



He started the Keith Bulluck Believe & Achieve Foundation as a way to help give these children the tools they need to realize their dreams – supplies, scholarships, and mentors to whom they can relate. Keith is an extremely charitable and appreciative person; while a member of the Titans he also started the Steve McNair Iron Will Scholarship in memory of the Titans' outstanding quarterback who was tragically killed.

After a stellar 10-year career with the Titans, Keith returned home, signed a one-year contract, and finished his career with his hometown New York Giants as one of their starting linebackers. He became an unrestricted free agent at the end of the season. His final NFL statistics are outstanding. Keith finished his career with 21 interceptions, six of which he returned for touchdowns. In his 11 years in the NFL Keith had a total of 1,088 combined tackles. He did not play in the 2011 season and after having a year off, he announced his retirement. On August 3, 2012, Keith Bulluck formally retired from the National Football League with the team who drafted him, the Tennessee Titans. He became the first player in Titans' franchise history to formally retire from their organization.

Keith currently is employed by the SiriusXM satellite radio company as an NFL football analyst. He is enrolled at George Washington University in its Executive MBA program, working toward a master's degree in Business Administration. Keith and his wife, Heather Weeks Bulluck, are recently married and have three daughters: Keira, 5; Kenzi, 3; and Kodie, 4 months. They live in Edgewater, N.J.

KHYL FARRISON

Suffern High School Class of 1999

Rockland County might have produced better football players, maybe better wrestlers, or even more skilled baseball players, but no one has excelled more in all three sports on a local and state level than Khyl Farrison. As a true three-sport athlete you knew from the time Khyl was a young boy that he was going to be something special. As an eighth-grader, Khyl played freshman football and wrestled on the varsity level. When he reached Suffern High School, Khyl played junior varsity football and baseball as a freshman while continuing to wrestle on the powerful Suffern varsity wrestling team. In his sophomore year Khyl moved to the varsity level in both football and baseball, making him a three-sport varsity athlete. When Khyl graduated from Suffern he had won an astonishing 11 varsity letters and had been voted captain of his team every season during his senior year. The 11 varsity letters in three different sports is not the most astonishing fact; that Khyl achieved All-State honors in each sport is. For his all-around achievements, Khyl was inducted into the Suffern High School Sports Hall of Fame in 2011.

On the football field Khyl was a two-way starter who rushed for 2,072 yards in his career. In his junior and senior years, Khyl was selected to the All-Section 1 team. As a senior Khyl was selected first team All-County running back and punter by The Journal News. He was also selected as the Most Valuable Player in the Section 1 bowl game, which Suffern won. In addition, Khyl was selected as the first team All-State punter.

Making the varsity wrestling team at Suffern High School is no easy task. Five-year varsity starters are few and far between. By the time he was finished wrestling, Khyl had 145 victories, the second best in Suffern history at the time. Khyl now sits in fifth place overall in Suffern wrestling wins. During his career Khyl was a five-time Rockland County tournament finalist, a three-time Rockland County champion, a three-time Section 1 champion, and a three-time New York State place winner, finishing third as a sophomore, fifth as a junior, and second as a senior. Twice Khyl was voted as the Most Outstanding Wrestler at the Section 1 tournament. In his senior year Khyl was selected as The Journal News Athlete of the season. In 2011 Khyl was inducted into the Section 1 Wrestling Hall of Fame.

In the springtime Khyl turned to his first love, and favorite sport, baseball. He was equally successful there. As a three-year varsity player, Khyl was selected first team All-County and All-Section 1 each of those three years. Khyl batted over .400 for the Mounties (.493, .401, .459) every year as a starting outfielder/pitcher. He had a combined career record of 11-4

with 3 saves on the mound. At the end of his senior year, in which Suffern was crowned the Section 1 champion, Khyl was selected to the New York State first-team squad as an outfielder.

Upon graduating from high school Khyl enrolled at Rockland Com-



munity College and was an outstanding member of the baseball team. He then transferred to Long Island University and was a three-year starter in the outfield.

Khyl earned his associate's degree at Rockland Community College before picking up his bachelor's degree in Sports Science from Long Island University in 2004. Farrison is certified by the National Strength and Conditioning Association, Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Association and National Academy of Sports Medicine and is CPR-AED certified.

Khyl is embarking on a new career in the Rockland County Sheriff's Department, and is currently in training for that profession while working as a Corrections Officer for the county. Khyl had worked the past three years as a strength and conditioning coach at Seton Hall University, working primarily with the men's basketball program. He came to the Pirates from Iona College after spending two years as the Gaels' head strength and conditioning coach. Khyl was responsible for the design and implementation of weight training and all other aspects of athletic performance for men's basketball and other athletics programs. At Iona, Khyl oversaw the athletic performance for the department's 22 athletics programs. He was also solely responsible for the management of lona's varsity weight room. Prior to joining Iona, he held the same position at Manhattanville College. Khyl also served as an assistant strength and conditioning coach at Yale, where he designed and implemented strength-training programs for 12 varsity men's and women's programs, and assisted Yale's head strength and conditioning coach. In 2005-06, Khyl worked as a graduate assistant strength and conditioning coach at Alabama-Birmingham, where he designed strength programs for the Division I softball and men's tennis teams. Khyl and his wife, Mandy, whom he met at L.I.U., currently live in Hillburn and have a 2-year-old son, Braelyn. Mandy is the athletic director and physical education teacher for the Equality Charter School in New York City. They are expecting twins very soon.

GARY GRAY

Nyack High School Coach, 1981-2006


One of the most successful programs in the history of Rockland County sports is Nyack basketball. The man responsible for that program's success in Gary Gray. Gary, a Nyack native, played varsity basketball at Nyack for two years, before moving on to play basketball for Hall of Famer Howie Pierson at Rockland Community College. Gary transferred to the University of South Florida to complete his education and after graduating from USF Gary returned to his alma mater to begin his teaching and coaching career. He took over the Nyack boys' varsity basketball program in 1981 after four years as a junior varsity coach.

For 26 years Gary guided the Nyack boys' basketball team to an amazing record. His teams won 432 games and lost only 115, averaging 17 wins per season. That total places Gary in second place in Rockland County among boys' basketball coaches in career wins, sixth in Section 1 for career wins, and inside the top 50 among all New York State boys' basketball coaches for career wins. For 11 of those seasons Nyack had 20 or more wins. Gary's teams won 14 league titles, 14 Red and Black Tournaments, 15 Albertus Magnus Holiday Tournaments and never lost a game in the prestigious Red Fox Shoot Out for six years. Gary's teams won a Rockland County-best four Section 1 titles and won two New York State Regional titles. Two of Gary's teams, 1991 and 2001, made it to the New York State final four, and the 1991 team lost in the finals in overtime. That 1991 team was designated as "Team of the Year" by the Basketball Coaches Association of New York, and that same association designated the Nyack program "Team of the Decade" for the years 1991-2001. Twice Gary was chosen as The Journal News Rockland County Coach of the Year and eight times he was chosen as League Coach of the Year.

Many of Gary's players continued to have outstanding careers after leaving Nyack. Seven of his players went on to become NCAA Division I scholarship players. He coached two Division II All-Conference players and one Division III All-America player. Three of Gary's former players went on to play professionally, two in Europe and one in the developmental league of the NBA. Through his guidance and development, Nyack basketball players earned thousands of dollars of muchneeded scholarship money to further their educations.

While teaching in Nyack Gary served his community in many ways. He coached the girls' varsity soccer program on two different occasions. First from 1976 to 1981 and was voted as Coach of the Year in 1981, and then again from 2004 to 2006 when he was again voted Coach of the Year in 2006 when he took the team to the playoffs for the first time in many years. For 10 years Gary coached the modified baseball team in Nyack and never had a losing season. Academically Gary

initiated the "Morning Program" in the Nyack School District and 37 years later this physical education and social program is still in effect. The "Morning Program" is a daily 20-minute program where the whole elementary school (more than 500 children) would meet and work together in various



physical education activities and on occasion meet a variety of motivational people. Gary was a Eucharist Minister, gospel reader, and vocalist at St Ann's Church where he has taught religious education on Saturday morning to elementary school children. In addition, Gary also wrote two nationally published articles, one pertaining to physical education in general and the other dealing with teaching blind students in physical education. During the 1985-86 school year due in part to his work in the "Morning Program" Gary was also chosen as one of the Rockland delegates for the "Teacher in Space" program.

Gary is now retired from the Nyack School District but still lives in the community and works part-time for Schultz Ford. He and his wife Mary Ann have two sons: Geoffrey, 36, who lives with his wife, Kristin, in Scottsdale, Ariz., and works for ING; and Brendan, 33, who works for Nyack Hospital.

BUD KAST

Pearl River High School Class of 1938

Edward Robert "Bud" Kast Jr. went from the playing fields of Pearl River to the hallowed Ivy-covered walls of Dartmouth to a distinguished career in education as a headmaster at independent schools in three different states.

Bud attained All-County recognition in football, baseball and basketball. Perhaps his greatest claim to fame on the high school level was his starring role as a halfback on the 1937 Pearl River football team, which won the Rockland County championship, went undefeated against county opponents and did not yield a point to Rockland schools the entire season.


The '37 Pirates, coached by Ira Shuttleworth, were known as the "Wonder Team" for their unexpected dominance on the gridiron, led by Kast. The Pirates blanked all four Rockland rivals and shut out three New Jersey opponents to boot. The only points they allowed that magical season came in a narrow 6-0 loss to Westwood, N.J. Twelve Pearl River players were named to the first or second team All-County squad. Accompanying Bud in the backfield were John "Gintz" Koleduk, Frank Clay Fisher, fellow Rockland Hall of Famer Alex Zilko, and Chick Sickles. The team captains were center Bill Staats, tackle Donald "Streaky" Stevenson and Fisher, and the line was anchored by Walt Cosey, a unanimous All-County choice.

Bud was an outfielder and first baseman who made the All-County baseball team his senior year. He also made honorable mention All-County in basketball as a forward. Bud finished his scholastic career with a flourish, earning the Knights of Columbus Award as the outstanding athlete from the class of 1938. He was inducted into the Pearl River Sports Hall of Fame in 2000 and the 1937 football team was enshrined in 2006.

After a one-year stint at Staunton (Va.) Military Academy, where he lettered in all three sports, Bud enrolled at Dartmouth College. He was a three-year starter at right halfback for legendary coach Earl "Red" Blaik, led the team in rushing each year and captained the team his senior year. His college exploits were regularly chronicled in the local media – "Bud Kast Shines in Dartmouth's Victory" read one headline in the Orangetown Free-Press, written by fellow Hall of Famer Art Hopper. "Kast Plays Big Role" read another account in a 7-0 victory over Yale.

In the fall of 1942, after his senior football season, Bud was drafted into the Army during World War II. Like many Ivy Leaguers who were drafted into service, he was assigned to intelligence operations. At the conclusion of infantry training

he was assigned to the Office Strategic Services, the forerunner to today's CIA, in Washington, D.C. After learning the science of codes and ciphers, he was sent to Signal Corps Officer Candidate School, then back Washington and off to China. He was discharged as a first



lieutenant in January 1946 and returned to Dartmouth in March to complete studies for his B.A. degree in English. He received his master's degree in education from New York University.

Bud's first job out of college in September 1946 was as an English teacher at Short Hills (N.J.) Country Day School, for students from preschool through eighth grade. He served as assistant headmaster for three years and as headmaster for the duration on his tenure there, which lasted until 1964. He then became headmaster at the Hawken School in Cleveland, Ohio, and in 1970 moved on to Germantown Academy in the Philadelphia suburbs, where he remained as headmaster until his retirement in 1986. Both schools serve students from preschool to 12th grade.

Besides his interest in athletics, Bud was a fervent supporter of the arts and played a key role in the development of arts centers at both the Hawken School and Germantown Academy. He served on numerous school boards and his professional affiliations included stints as chair of the National Association of Independent Schools and president of the Headmasters Association of the United States. At his retirement in 1986 he moved to Vermont to live in the house he and his wife, Angela, had built in 1972 in the state's northeastern woodlands. He continued his services as an educational consultant on a limited basis and served on the local public school board in Hardwick for 12 years.

Bud had three children, all daughters: Christine Bjorner, 70, of Stockholm, Sweden; Patty Meyer, 66, of East Hardwick, Vt.; and Gigi Kast (Parker), 61, of Velarde, N.M. He also had nine grandchildren: four from Christine (Edward, 41; Katja, 39; Siri, 37; and Elise, 31), four from Patty (Tom, 44; Andrew, 42; Taylor, 38; and Nick, 36); and one from Gigi (Shane Parker, 28); and 13 great grandchildren.

Bud Kast died in 2007 at age 84. He devoted the last 15 years of his life to caring for Angela, who died in 2009 at age 86.

MIKE ROTUNDO

Tappan Zee High School Class of 1954

Mike Rotundo epitomized the multitalented Tappan Zee athlete of the early 1950s. He earned an astonishing 16 varsity letters – four each in cross country, basketball, baseball and track – and helped propel the Dutchmen to six County championships and nine Section 9 titles, including four each in basketball and cross country. He also garnered seven All-County citations – three in basketball, two in track, and one each in baseball and cross country. In 1953 he was accorded All-America status by a sports magazine as one of the premier high school basketball players in New York State. By Mike's count he won 26 team and individual championships in County and Section 9 competition.

As a seventh-grader at Sparkill Elementary School, Mike was tabbed by Nick Mottola, TZ's athletic director and three-sport coach, as one of several promising athletes who would form the cornerstone of the Dutchie sports "franchise" in succeeding years. Those seventh- and eighth-graders wasted no time making their marks. Mike made the varsity basketball team as a gangly 6-foot-1, 135-pound freshman and teamed with Howie Pierson, Hubie Nealy, Ed Spiegel, John Mercurio and Joe D'Auria to capture two Rockland PSAL and four Section 9 titles. Pierson, Nealy, Mercurio and D'Auria all are fellow Rockland Hall of Famers, as is Coach Mottola. In 1954 Tappan Zee became the first Rockland team to score 100 points in a game, accomplishing the feat twice, in a 103-65 victory over Pearl River and 112-28 romp over Spring Valley.


"We had played together since seventh grade," says Mike, who set a school record with 17 straight successful free throws. "We didn't even have to look – we knew where everybody was on the court. We were a true team. In one game against Nyack, I was on pace to break the record [for points in a game] and in the second half the guys started feeding me the ball. But I told them to stop – it ruined the balance of the team."

After the season, Tappan Zee became the first high school team to win the renowned St. Peter's Tournament, which assembled premier college, pro and semipro players from the New York metro area. "We outran, out-defended and out-shot everybody," Mike says. They couldn't watch all five of us."

In the spring Mike and some mates split their time between baseball and track. "We had to, otherwise we couldn't field a team for track," he says. After finishing a ballgame, "we would throw our bats down and run over to the track to help out the track team." In baseball he was a slugging All-County centerfielder who "loved to roam the outfield."

In track, he won the Section 9 Class C/D high jump, long jump and 880-yard relay three straight years, ran on the County winning 880 relay in 1952, leaped a Rockland-leading mark of

20-feet-4 the long jump, even placed third in County the shot put as a senior. Mike was also triple winner at the prestigious New Paltz Relays which were patterned after the Penn Relays - and might have



had a couple more long jump titles if he didn't have to depart while leading the competition to attend a Piermont-sponsored sports dinner for Tappan Zee athletes. A growth spurt during eighth grade caused knee trouble that prevented Mike from playing a contact sport like football, so in the fall he joined cross country and helped the Hugh Short-coached Dutchies win two Rockland PSAL and four Section 9 crowns. He made All-County as a sophomore in 1954, placing fifth in the County championship meet.

Mike spent one year at Bowling Green State University in Ohio, playing freshman basketball for the Falcons, before embarking on a year-long tour in the West and Midwest with the Harlem Clowns traveling basketball team. Mike played for the foil team that opposed the Clowns, like the Washington Generals to the Harlem Globetrotters.

Coaching became one of Mike's passions in his adult life and he got his start skippering the Cornhuskers, a team sponsored by Doctor Davies farm in Congers, in a local independent basketball league. He then spent 21 years, from 1964 to 1984, as freshman basketball coach at Albertus Magnus High School under Lou Kliewe and later, Tom Collins, both of whom he cites as models of coaching excellence.

Mike was a banker for 40 years and has worked in security at the County health complex in Pomona for the past 17 years. Born in Piermont and raised in Sparkill, Mike is 77 (he turns 78 on May 13) and lives in Pomona. He has four children: Mickey, who is 55; Mark, 54; Tim, 51; and Janine, 48; and two grandchildren – Sara, 16, and Jake, 12.

Mike also was inducted into the Albertus Magnus Hall of Fame in 2011 and the Tappan Zee Hall of Fame twice, as a member of the 1954 championship basketball team in 2010 and as an individual in 2011.

JODI SCHLESINGER SALSBERG

Clarkstown South High School Class of 1999

Someday, a Rockland County athlete may eclipse Jodi Schlesinger Salsberg's records.

That athlete might have to suspend the laws of gravity to do it, though.

How else to follow a celestial act that hasn't remotely been approached, never mind replicated? Bounding into triple-jump immortality, here was Jodi — far from the fleetest, tallest or strongest athlete in the field but surely the most skilled and technically proficient. The girl from Clarkstown South who loved coming to practice each day rehearsed those jumping drills probably thousands of times, like a great actress sweating the details, never supremely satisfied no matter how monumental the performance.

Jodi monopolized her event as no Rockland athlete ever has. She won an unprecedented three national scholastic championships and seven New York State titles, including four straight triple jumps outdoors and one long jump. On top of that, Jodi captured two national Junior Olympic crowns, in the Youth and Intermediate divisions, 14 Rockland County and 13 Section 1 Class A gold medals, three Loucks Games trophies, two Golden West Invitational medals and four finalist appearances at the Penn Relays.

In all, Jodi claimed 75 major meet championships, including 50 in the triple jump, and became the first athlete, male or female, to win the same event (outdoor triple jump) five straight years at the County meet. Thus it's no surprise the award presented to the County meet's outstanding field-event performer is named in honor of Jodi.

A title, once attained, can never be taken away. The "awards" room in the Schlesinger home in Bardonia attests to the array of championships Jodi accrued during her six-year high school career. Records are usually more transitory, but not so much in her case. She still holds five New York State class records in the triple jump and once held a sixth. Her outdoor mark of 41 feet 10.75 inches is more than a foot farther than any other Rockland girl and ranks No. 2 all-time statewide, and her indoor best of 40-8.75 is No. 4 on the state list. Jodi set national scholastic class records for a freshman (39-0.5) and sophomore (40-1.25) and a USATF age-group record for 13-14-year-olds (38-10.5), all of which have been broken. She also ranks as No. 5 Rocklander in the long jump both outdoors (18-11.5) and indoors (18-6.25).

Jodi was indoctrinated early in the fundamentals of running and jumping by her father, Don, a former Metropolitan IC sprint champion and record-holder at CCNY who later taught and coached track on the junior high level. Jodi was doing standing long jumps at



age 4 and qualified for her first national competition, the Junior Olympics, at 9. By seventh grade, when she joined the South track team while a student at Felix Festa Middle School, she already had the earmarks of a difference-maker for the Vikings. The triple jump seemed to suit her intellectual, analytical and physical abilities perfectly.

"I was fast, but not pure sprinter fast," Jodi says. "I was tall, but not high jumper tall, and I was strong and powerful, but not to an extreme. However, being pretty good on all of those fronts, and then combining it with being very good at the technical mechanics and understanding the physics involved in a triple jump, made for a combination of excellence."

With so many notches in her belt, it's hard for Jodi to single out one watershed moment. The national and state titles are way up there, of course, but so is the near-perfect senior year when her only loss occurred at the Penn Relays. The class records, County-meet naming honor and Clarkstown South Wall of Fame recognition also figure prominently as personal sources of pride, but none parallel the transforming impact made on her development by the South coaching staff — outdoor coach Giulia Duitz, indoor coach Ray Sussmann, and head coach/sprints coach Ray Kondracki.

"To say I had a positive experience and relationship is an understatement," Jodi says. "I joined the high school team as a seventh grader and I was barely 12 years old. Sussmann, Duitz and Kondracki spent more time with me over the next six years than any other teachers or individuals I can think of outside of my own parents. They were like a second family to me, and my time with them influenced me not only as an athlete, but as a person."

Jodi remains close to her former coaches at South. All three attended her wedding in 2005. Giulia Duitz was a bridesmaid, her children were the flower girl and ring bearer, and Jodi is godmother to her son. The coaches were also pillars of support helping Jodi through the death of her infant daughter, Lauren

Juliet, in December 2010, and were there to help celebrate the birth of her son, Logan Robert, in January 2012.

Along with her coaches, Jodi's teammates played an instrumental role in her unmatched success. Fellow jumper Kelly Barrett provided sound guidance and friendship to a young Jodi, who would later surpass her marks, and Paul Golando and Tommy Thothongkum, distinguished jumpers in their own right, also spent many hours together with Jodi in practice and at meets. "Part of the reason that I was successful is that I stuck with it and enjoyed training and going to practice,' Jodi says. "That was 100 percent because of the coaches and teammates that I shared my time with."

A model student-athlete, Jodi graduated from South as valedictorian of her class and attended Duke University on a full athletic scholarship – one of the first full-tuition scholarships for a women's track and field athlete awarded by the school. Her jumping career at Duke was marred by a serious hamstring injury sustained at the outdoor Junior Nationals at the end of her senior year at South. She redshirted most of her freshman year at Duke and endured a prolonged recovery from the

setback. Still, she did recapture some of the form that propelled her to prep stardom, setting still-standing school records in the triple jump outdoors (41-5.75) and indoors (40-3.5), receiving two All-East designations and winning the 2001 Duke Invitational.

After earning an economics degree from Duke – she graduated magna cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa – Jodi went to work on Wall Street as an options trader at Morgan Stanley. Then, she served as a vice president in Goldman Sachs' Structured Products group, in charge of the Philadelphia, Washington D.C., Atlanta, Houston and Dallas offices. Jodi, who is 32, met her husband, Aaron, on her first day of college at Duke and the couple will celebrate their eighth wedding anniversary next month. They reside in Nutley, N.J., with their 15-month-old son.

Jodi was inducted into the Clarkstown South Sports Hall of Fame in 2004, and was honored by the New York Jewish Sports Hall of Fame as the Jules D. Mazor Outstanding Jewish High School Athlete of the Year in her senior year. She also was enshrined in the Rockland County Track & Field Hall of Fame in 2012.

EDWARD WANAMAKER


Nyack High School Class of 1972

Edward Wanamaker followed in his father's footsteps as an outstanding athlete and leader at Nyack High School. Now he follows his father Wilbur "Web" Wanamaker, a 2011 inductee, into the Rockland County Sports Hall of Fame. During his formative years Ed's father, Wilbur, and mother, Bea, encouraged Ed, along with his siblings, Don, Nancy, Tom and Wilbur to become involved at the Nyack YMCA. Here they learned to swim and play a variety of sports. His accomplishments both in sports and the classroom are a testimony to the qualities of this man. As a four-sport varsity athlete Ed still found time to serve as vice president in his junior year and as president of his senior class in 1972.

As a sophomore Ed lettered in two sports; he was a varsity pitcher and outfielder for the baseball team, and the starting fullback on Nyack's PSAL championship soccer team. In his junior year Ed lettered in four varsity sports. He was a starter and second team All-County fullback on Nyack's undefeated (16-0) PSAL, Section 9 and New York State Regional championship soccer team. In the winter Ed managed to play on two varsity teams; he played on the varsity hockey team and started on the PSAL and Section 9 volleyball championship team. The spring season of Ed's junior year brought him and Nyack their third championship season. Ed was a pitcher and outfielder on the Rockland County PSAL and Section 9 championship baseball team.

In his senior year, Ed led his soccer team to their fifth consecutive championship, plus a host of individual awards were bestowed upon him. He captained the PSAL championship soccer team and captained the hockey team to a second-place finish in the Hudson Valley Hockey League. Nyack finished with the best county team record, losing the championship game to St. Mary's 4-2. In the spring Ed batted .415 as a starting pitcher and outfielder on the baseball team. Ed was

voted All County first team in all three sports and in the spring Ed was selected to the first team All-Metropolitan New York Daily News baseball team. But it was on the soccer field that Ed was a real star. Not only was he voted team MVP but The Journal News selected



Ed as the Rockland County Soccer Player of the Year. John Whisker, Ed's soccer coach in his senior year, described him by saying, "Wanamaker was the hub of our team, he stopped the opposition's offense and started our offense. Ed broke up the opposition's drives and turned it around. He was the team's leader." The late Rudy Rejholec, former Nyack athletic director and a Rockland Hall of Famer said of Ed, "Ed Wanamaker was one of the best all-around athletes that we ever had at Nyack High School. I wish I had a whole team of athletes like Eddie Wanamaker."

After graduating from Nyack High School, Ed was recruited to play soccer for Wabash College in Crawfordsville, Ind. Always one to stay active, while at Wabash College Ed played club hockey for two years, varsity baseball for three years and varsity soccer for all four years. In 1976 Ed was selected as the soccer team's Most Valuable Player.

After graduating from college Ed worked for Savin Business Machines for two years and then became a self-employed carpenter, a career that he still enjoys today. He currently lives in Brewster, Mass. He is the proud father of five children: Jessica, 32; Laura, 19; Julius, 16; Shannon, 11; and Honora, 8.

Joseph Holland Lifetime Achievement Award

DEER HEAD INN AND SOFTBALL TOURNAMENT

Vic Alfieri Sr., Ernie Capobianco, Vic Alfieri Jr.

The Deer Head Inn and Deer Head softball tournament were institutions in Rockland County for more than two decades. The tournament, based at the Deer Head Inn field in West Nyack, was widely regarded as one of the most prestigious circuits in the New York metropolitan region. If you played well at the Deer Head, your reputation was embossed in gold in the eyes of the greater softball community.

The Deer Head Inn was a bar and restaurant purchased by Vic Alfieri Sr. and his brother-in-law, Ernie Capobianco, in 1958. They operated the establishment until 1987, when it was sold. The Deer Head tournament, held at the field behind the Inn, was started in 1966 by Jack Cuff of Clarkstown and taken over by Vic Alfieri Jr., his father and uncle in 1968. The invitational tournament attracted anywhere from 50 to 75 teams from throughout the tri-state area in a given year, with a high-water mark of 88 teams during its heyday in the 1970s. The tourney ran from mid-July to mid-October on one field, although at one time an extra field was acquired from the Town of Clarkstown near its sanitary landfill - the inelegantly named "Dump Field" – to enable 12 or 13 games to be played per day. In fact, that field was favored by former Yankee farmhand and Haverstraw legend Jo Jo Mackey, whose slick infield play for the Orange Lantern team impressed Vic Jr. enough to merit a Gold Glove award. "You played great in the games in front of me," Vic Jr. told him. Mackey replied, "Yeah, but I made six errors at the Deer Head field!"

Mackey was just one of dozens of high-caliber players to grace the Deer Head tournament during its 31-year run from 1966 to 1996. Howie Pierson of Piermont, like Mackey an ex-minor leaguer (with the Phillies) and fellow County Hall of Famer, once hit a ball that cleared the trees beyond the left-field fence, a prodigious blow that eyewitness Vic Jr. says "probably landed in the swamp somewhere in the Hackensack River. He must have hit it 400 feet or more."

Among the many other talented players who made their mark at Deer Head were former Yankee infielder Phil Linz, Rockland Softball Hall of Famer Don Kastner – a speedy outfielder with a patented diving catch – infielder Bob Tortorello, and profes-

sional players Art Lopez, Jim and Pete Bouton, and Al Benza.

When the discussion turns to teams that competed at Deer Head, Apollo 12 stands at the pinnacle. The year 1968 was a turbulent time for race relations in America, and Rockland was not



immune from the tensions. However, Vic Jr., then in his first year as tournament director, felt that having an African-American team in the tournament would be a step toward fostering closer relations in the community. With the blessing of his father and Uncle Ernie, he recruited an all-black team sponsored by the Drift Inn, a bar in Nyack.

"I had graduated from Nyack High School and knew the history of the area," Vic Jr. says. "I felt that what was happening at the time in Nyack wouldn't translate into any [negative] action on the ball field. It was a different world on the field of play; things would not spill over." Vic Jr.'s assessment was accurate. The Drift Inn team, which became known as Apollo 12, won the tournament a few years later and added three more championships for a total of four, a record never broken. The team was managed and sponsored by Ted Davis and Bo Welsch, who like Vic Jr. are members of the Rockland County Softball Hall of Fame.

The roster of marquee teams at Deer Head is long and distinguished, but any grouping of top-tier clubs in the tournament must include Orange Lantern, a multiple-time champion, Camp Hill Day Camp, Holt Landscaping, Tumble Inn from Haverstraw, Andy's Men's Wear and Modern Auto Body, among others. Leo's Ivy Shop, a team of predominantly Hispanic players from Haverstraw that Vic Jr. recruited, triggered a trend at Deer Head in the early 1970s that caught on around softball diamonds throughout the country, he says. Leo's players were aggressive base runners, running all-out to first, taking the turn toward second and frequently stretching singles into doubles. At that time the short fielder was normally positioned behind second base or as a fourth outfielder, but teams at Deer Head started moving their short fielder to directly over second base to try to thwart the swift Leo's base runners. Thus was born the "over second-baseman" - an innovation that quickly spread as the need arose on playing fields everywhere.

Vic Jr. remained the primary tournament director until 1988 when he was elected a town judge in Clarkstown. He stepped down as director because judges were prohibited by law from raising money for charity, and the tournament was a charitable fund-raiser. The tournament was taken over in 1988 by Vic Sr., Ernie, Bob Augat and Tony Milewski. Augat immediately came up with the idea for sponsor signage on the outfield walls and the tournament generated \$10,000 in signage that first year, Vic Jr. says. Generous sponsorship by OTB also enabled Deer

Head to contribute more toward its charitable beneficiaries, the most notable of which were ARC, Jawonio, Venture, and Rockland Friends of Autistic Children.

The tournament continued until 1996, when the property was sold and the field developed for residential homes. Vic. Sr. is deceased, and Ernie Capobianco is in his 90s but "still active," Vic Jr. says. Vic Jr. has been a Rockland County Court judge since 2006.■

- C. Be a person of integrity and good character.
- D. Candidates cannot be considered until 10 years after their high school class graduation, except in special cases.
