We celebrate our 41st Rockland County Sports Hall of Fame induction with a stellar group of athletes, coaches and a renowned photographer. The Nanuet Knights give us Rick Carey, Journal-News Athlete of the Decade for his barrier-breaking 7-foot high jump and three State championships, and Thaddeus Wilson, an outstanding hurdler and football player who served in the Navy with distinction and currently makes all senior 60+ athletes proud with his mas-



ters track achievements. We recognize two former Mounties in Richard Schumacher, a three-sport standout for Suffern, outstanding collegiate wrestler and coach who clearly loves what he does, and Ed Kolakowski, a well-recognized basketball coach who contributed much to County sports as a player, coach and official.

Don Fischer, a star swimmer and integral member of the Tappan Zee swim dynasty of the '70s, represents the Flying Dutchmen of South Orangetown. Tom DePatto, a top baseball hurler for Haverstraw and Ithaca College, went on to coach Clarkstown and Clarkstown South cross country teams to numerous championships with his innovative style.

Lorraine Moylan, the superb coach for Albertus Magnus and Pearl River girls' basketball, amassed the most wins by a basketball coach in Rockland County history. As a passionate coach who loved her craft she was able to get the most out of her players. I've enjoyed working with Lorraine for the past seven years as a fellow board member of the Rockland County Sports Hall of Fame. Al Witt was an outstanding Journal-News photographer who specialized in capturing the moment in sports with his angles and fearless approach to getting the right shot. A World War II veteran who served his country gallantly, Al was able to photograph sports in the golden age of newspapers.

In the past year we experienced the passing of Ernie Capobianco, who together with Vic Alfieri Sr. and Vic Alfieri Jr. ran the Deer Head Inn and softball tournament from 1966 to 1996, where the best softball players from the County and region competed. Marvin Hampson, one of our board directors from 1998-1999, also passed away during the past year. They will be missed.

ENSHRINEMENT REQUIREMENTS

The Rockland County Sports Hall of Fame was established to honor outstanding sportsmen and sportswomen, living and deceased, who have gained prominence while residing or competing in, or have brought recognition to Rockland County. To be considered for nomination to the Hall of Fame, candidates must meet the following criteria:

- A. Attain prominence in sports as an athlete, coach, manager, official, owner, writer, broadcaster or supporter.
- B. Reside or have resided in Rockland County, competed here at the time of their prominence, or brought fame to Rockland County as a result of their accomplishments.
- C. Be a person of integrity and good character.
- D. Candidates cannot be considered until 10 years after their high school class graduation, except in special cases.

Our committee encourages the public to send athletic resumes/nominations of prospective candidates to Screening Committee chairman Bob Veltidi, 400 Jersey Avenue, Greenwood Lake, NY 10925. Nominees are reviewed by this committee and, if accepted, voted upon for enshrinement by the committee as a whole.

The Hall of Fame Committee holds monthly meetings the first Tuesday of the month from October to May. Anyone wishing to join the organization should write to Chairman Pete Scheibner, 1 Captain McGovern Drive, Stony Point, N.Y. 10980, or e-mail him at scheibnp@msn.com.

Each inductee in the Rockland County Sports Hall of Fame receives a commemorative trophy and is further honored with an individual plaque, which is given to the inductee's high school for public display.

The Rockland County Sports Hall of Fame is more than awards and trophies and dinners, however. It is really about people – Rockland County people who have had an impact in the world of sports. A total of 239 such individuals have been honored since the hall's inception in 1974.

The Hall of Fame has evolved from those early beginnings to become a recognized presence in Rockland County athletics. In addition to its annual dinner, where it honors new inductees, the hall makes sizable donations to worthwhile local organizations and charities. Nanuet High School Class of 1978

No matter what else Rick Carey has accomplished in the high jump – the three state titles, the Eastern States championship, the national and international success – his career will forever be defined by one unit of vertical measurement: seven feet, one-quarter inch.

That's how high Rick jumped in winning the Section 9 Class B championship in the spring of 1977, his junior year at Nanuet. No one in Rockland County has jumped as high, before or since. Like the four-minute mile, the 7-foot high jump was as much a psychological barrier as a physical one.

"Realizing it could be done was half the battle," Rick says. "You really couldn't psyche anybody out in the high jump, the bar did enough of that. It was an event where you could be friendly with everybody you competed against. You were really competing with yourself."

Nanuet track coach Dave Hanson called Rick's quantum leap "the greatest achievement in Section 9 track history." He equated it with a 9.4-second 100-yard dash, a 70-foot shot put or a 4:05 mile. The Journal-News rated it the top individual accomplishment in Rockland spring sports in the 1970s, and voted Rick the Rockland scholastic Athlete of the Decade. At the time, Rick ranked as the third-best high jumper in New York State history; his mark is still ranked tied for eighth on the state all-time list.

Of course, there was much more to Rick's track and field career than that one landmark clearance. He also captured three New York State titles, in the winter of 1977 and 1978 and the spring of 1978, and was state runner-up in the spring of 1977. Among his other noteworthy achievements were the Eastern States indoor crown in the 1977 winter track season; a second-place finish in the USA Junior National championships in Knoxville, Tenn., in the spring, 1977; and a fourth-place effort in the USA-vs.-USSR Junior dual track meet in Richmond, Va., also in the spring of 1977.

Then there were the local titles: six Rockland County championships – five in the high jump, one in the long jump – and handful of Section 9 Class B victories. He also established the Rockland indoor track record in the high jump at 6-feet-10.

At a stalk-like 6-feet-1, 135 pounds, Rick had the prototypical high-jumper's build with long legs, good flexibility and a fluid approach. He showed promise by jumping 6-2 as a freshman, 6-8 3/4 as a sophomore, and 6-10 several times as a junior before breaching the historic 7-foot plateau. Like many high jumpers, he did not march to the same beat as his teammates.



I was a free spirit back then," says Rick, who is 54 and lives in Houston. "I liked the fact that it was 60 feet [approach run to the bar] and I'm done. In a way I felt guilty because it came so easy for me, and a lot of guys did a lot more work than me. I needed some guidance and [coaches] Dave Hanson and Ed Denton pointed me in the right direction. I zig-zagged a little bit, but I got there."

After graduating from Nanuet, Rick attended the University of Houston on a track scholarship, but a knee injury to his takeoff (left) leg prevented him from competing. He transferred to Mount San Antonio College, a junior college in Walnut, Calif., for his sophomore year, managing a best of 6-10. He then returned to Houston for his junior year but sustained an ankle injury and essentially ended his high-jumping career at that time.

He remained in the Houston area and became a watchmaker. After a decade in that trade, Rick switched to clocks. For several years he worked for a Houston company that restores antique clocks, and in 2003 opened his own retail clock repair shop. He now operates a wholesale business repairing clocks for other shops.

Rick and his wife, Linda, have been married 22 years. He has a stepdaughter, Lanette, 43; a grandson, Drew, 12; and a grand-daughter, Ella, 9.

Haverstraw High School Class of 1960

Tom DePatto was a native Rockland County athlete who chose to come back home and spend his life coaching other Rockland County athletes to greatness. As an athlete at Haverstraw High School Tom played basketball and baseball. In his senior year, 1960, Tom was a star pitcher on the Red Raider baseball team, finishing the season with a 9-1 record.

After graduation from Haverstraw High School Tom enrolled at Ithaca College in the physical education program and concentrated on playing baseball. With one year of freshman baseball under his belt, Tom was promoted to the varsity pitching staff as a sophomore. The Ithaca College baseball team played a major college schedule at that time and, in Tom's sophomore year; Ithaca was one of only eight teams to qualify for the NCAA College World Series in Omaha, Nebraska. They won their first game against Missouri but lost the next two to the University of Florida and the University of Texas. In Tom's junior year, while being a regular starter in the rotation, Ithaca's baseball team went 16-2 but did not qualify for the World Series. In 1964, Tom's senior year, Ithaca was outstanding again and qualified for the College World Series with Tom as the ace of the staff. Unfortunately, the major universities were too much for Ithaca to handle.

Although there were some inquiries from the Montreal Expos, after graduation from Ithaca College in 1964, Tom decided to take a job with the City of Ithaca's recreation department. He quickly rose to the position of recreation director and along the way; Tom met and married his wife, MaryLew.

In 1967 Tom returned to Rockland County when he was hired by the Clarkstown School District as a physical education teacher and cross country coach at Clarkstown High School. Tom was the cross country coach for more than two decades, first at Clarkstown High School (which became Clarkstown North), and then at South High when it opened. At Clarkstown High School Tom's cross country teams were Rockland County champions in 1969 and 1970, while that same group was Section 9 champion in 1968-69-70.

Joe Biddy, a Rockland Hall of Famer and the legendary Suffern cross country coach, says of those Tom DePatto teams, "In the 40 years that I've coached at Suffern, I can say this: That 1968-70 group was one of the first county dynasties. That, for its time, was as dominant as any of the other dynasties that came in the ensuing years from schools like Albertus Magnus, North Rockland, Pearl River, and Suffern."

As seniors that team won its third consecutive Section 9 cross country title and runners Kevin Dillon, Bob Dillon, Tim McEwen and Bruce Woolley finished 2nd, 6th, 7th and 8th as



Clarkstown finished 45 points ahead of runner-up Middletown. Biddy went on to say of that group, "They practiced and raced as a team, and they hung out together as a team. Tom encouraged camaraderie, loyalty, and respect among his athletes."

Tom's 1981 Clarkstown South cross country team, consisting of Jim McCarthy, Dan Glynn, Mike Colacino, Greg Kelly and Bob Malay, won the Rockland County and Section 9 championships and were third in the New York State meet during a driving snowstorm in upstate Malone.

Tom also coached wrestling at Clarkstown South for many years. His teams were always well schooled in the sport, tenacious competitors, and very good. In 1975 Tom DePatto coached Scott Ketcham to the heavyweight state championship in Syracuse and those points earned by Scott were the deciding factor in Section 9 winning their first team championship. While at South, Tom returned to his first love, baseball, and his 1977 team won the league championship.

Tom went on to be appointed the Director of Physical Education and Director of Athletics at Clarkstown South High School. He was an innovative leader and, as Athletic Director, Tom came up with a system to pick the All-County cross country team based on a mathematical formula that was used for many years.

Tom retired in 1999 from the Clarkstown Central School District and, unfortunately we lost him in 2003, way too soon. He leaves behind his wife, MaryLew, two children, Todd and LewAnn Tonna, son-in-law Greg Tonna and three grandchildren: Faith, LauraAnn and Lindsey Lew. In 2008 Tom was inducted posthumously into the Clarkstown South Sports Hall of Fame.

DON FISCHER

Tappan Zee High School Class of 1975

Don Fischer is a 1975 graduate of Tappan Zee High School and one of the original members of the TZ varsity swim team. He and his teammates help launch one of the most dominant athletic teams in Rockland County history.

Throughout his high school swimming career Don held Rockland County records in the 200-yard individual medley, 100 backstroke, 100 butterfly, 200 freestyle, 400 freestyle, and as a member of TZ's 400 freestyle relay. He held six individual school records and shared two more on relays. Don held the Rockland County record in the 200 IM from his freshman year through his senior year. Along the way, he also captured several Section 9 titles and records. As a senior, Don culminated his four-year TZ career (1972-75) by becoming Rockland County's first New York State scholastic boys' swimming champion, in the 200 individual medley, and added a runner-up finish in the 100 freestyle. Later in his senior year, he was also AAU State Champion in the 200 IM.

Don was one of the early marquee protégés of Don Driscoll, the legendary coach (and fellow Rockland Hall of Famer) who built the TZ program into a juggernaut that won 25 consecutive Rockland County titles. Don contributed to the Dutchmen's



dual-meet win streak that stood at 52 when he graduated in 1975. He earned an athletic scholarship to the University of South Carolina, where he was a National Independent, SEC and NCAA Championship qualifier.

Don is now a partner in a family-owned print, packaging and display business in Nyack. ED KOLAKOWSKI

Suffern High School Coach, 1954-1981


Ed Kolakowski is a first-generation American, born to Polish immigrants in Bayonne, New Jersey. Ed first played organized basketball at Bayonne Junior College where he was inserted into the lineup when the starting center was injured. While at Bayonne, Ed went on to become the leading scorer on the team.

After graduating from Bayonne, Ed enrolled at Siena College and joined the basketball team. Again after another player's injury, Ed won the starting center's role and stayed there for the remainder of his three-year career at Siena. Ed played a huge role that helped establish Siena as a major basketball power on the East Coast, and nationally. Ed was the top player on the 1949-50 team, whose record was 28-5. Siena College won the National Catholic Invitational Tournament that season, with Ed being the top rebounder on the team. During the 1950-51 season, Siena College led by Ed Kolakowski, pulled off a huge upset 51-47 victory over Seton Hall. Under Ed's leadership, Siena soared to become ranked 11th nationally by the Associated Press. Ed averaged 14.2 points a game that season and was selected to the East-West All-Star game, which was coached by the legendary Clair Bee. Ed is the only Siena College basketball player ever honored to have played in the East-West game that was held in a sold-out Madison Square Garden. Ed was inducted into the Siena College Athletic Hall of Fame in 1971. After the season Ed received a letter from the Syracuse Nationals of the NBA, but decided to forgo that offer and search for a more permanent job.

Ed married Jane Metzger, a student at St. Rose College, and coincidentally an usher at the Siena College basketball games. In 1951 he joined the Army and served his country overseas in Germany. While in the Army Ed played on the Fort Dix championship team and was the leading scorer on his Regiment team while in Germany. In the off season Ed also had a very successful baseball career while serving in Germany.

After being discharged from the Army, Ed was offered a teaching job in Suffern where he and Jane relocated, and in 1954 Ed became the varsity basketball coach, a position that he held with dignity for 27 years, and retired in 1981. His most memorable teams were: the 1960 Section 9 champions; the 1968 team where Ed was voted the RCPSAL Coach of the Year and they were Rockland County champions plus Section 9 Class B champions; and the 1973 Suffern team that beat Newburgh to win Section 9 AA-A championship.

Coaches and officials thought very highly of Ed Kolakowski and his teams. Ed McGrath, the former coach at Clarkstown/Clarkstown North and a Rockland County Hall of Famer, says of Ed, "He was an extremely intelligent coach; his



teams were well prepared. They played hard and competed well. After the game, win or lose, Ed was always a true gentleman." Jim Kane, another Rockland County Hall of Famer said of Ed, "His teams were well coached, played hard, and treated the game, the coaches, the opponents, and the officials with the respect they deserve."

While teaching and coaching in Suffern, Ed made an impact on Rockland County sports in other ways. In the '50s and '60s Ed played both competitive basketball and softball for the J.J. Brown Insurance Company team. In the summer Ed was an outstanding pitcher on the softball team, and in the winter Ed led the J.J. Brown basketball team as their center and leading scorer. Ed averaged 30 points a game despite being double and triple teamed most of the time. Ed was a perennial All-Tournament team player in the famous St. Peter's open tournament. Jim Kane, who played against him during that time, says of Ed, "Ed was, in my opinion, by far the best player I ever played against or ever seen play in Rockland."

Ed's mark on Rockland County was not limited to basketball and softball. For 30 years he was a football official. He was a member of Rockland County's elite football officiating team consisting of Jim Kane, Jerry Holstein, Herb Reilly and himself. Those four gentlemen worked every important high school football game played during that era and their judgment was never questioned. Ed also took time to work freshman and modified football games with young referees to teach and encourage new referees in the sport.

Ed retired in 1984 with his wife, Jane, to run Sunset Mt. Lodge in Brant Lake, N.Y., full time; they have owned the lodge since 1970. They have four sons: Giles, Kevin, Gary, and Kyle – all Suffern High School graduates. Ed and Jane still try to make as many Siena College basketball games as possible.



LORRAINE MOYLAN

Pearl River High School Class of 1976

Lorraine Moylan applied the lessons she learned on the basketball court in a record-setting coaching career at Albertus Magnus and her alma mater, Pearl River. In her 30 years of coaching girls' basketball, Lorraine won 21 league titles, 6 Section 1 championships, 5 Regional crowns, 2 New York State titles and 2 State Federation championships. She wound up with 536 career victories, a record for a Rockland basketball coach, boys or girls, and No. 2 all-time in Section 1 girls' basketball behind Gina Maher of Irvington. Lorraine's overall mark of 536 victories and only 140 losses works out to a stellar winning percentage of 79.3%.

Born in the Bronx, Lorraine moved to Pearl River when she was in the second grade. After she graduated from Pearl River High School in 1976, she earned a bachelor's degree in physical education from Central Connecticut State University and a master's degree in adaptive physical education from Long Island University. She played basketball throughout her elementary, high school and college careers.

Lorraine began her basketball coaching career as a JV coach at Spring Valley High School, followed by an assistant coaching stint at Mercy College in Westchester County. In 1983 she began her head coaching career at Albertus Magnus, where she led the Falcons to back-to-back New York State and Federation Class B championships in 1990-1991 and 1991-92. She returned to her alma mater in 1993 as a physical education teacher and varsity basketball coach. Lorraine retired as a coach after the 2012-13 season and continues to teach physical education.

"I have been blessed to have had so many excellent assistant coaches, and so many great players over the years," says Lorraine, who also coached JV soccer and softball at both Pearl River and Albertus and JV softball at Spring Valley. "They have inspired me to always strive to excel in every aspect of my life. They have taught me that the journey together is what is truly most important, not the destination."

As a young player Lorraine received guidance, fundamental training and support from the late Steve Baxter, her coach at St. Margaret's in CYO ball, and her brother Jack Guerci – "he's the one who developed my competitive spirit," she says. Her coaching influences included her mentor at Central Connecticut, Brenda Reilly, Carol Schachner Leib, under whom Lorraine served as assistant coach at Mercy, and Tom Collins, the Hall of Fame former boys' coach at Albertus Magnus who served as AD at both Albertus and Pearl River.

Lorraine coached many outstanding players during her threedecade tenure, but any listing of her top protégés would have to include, at Albertus: the Feeney sisters, Jen, MaryBeth and



Kathleen; the Feerick sisters, Margaret and Pat; Kim Behrens, and Eileen King. At Pearl River, her premier performers included Betsy McManus, Kelly McManus, Kaitlin O'Keefe, Kait Page, Christa and Missy Scognamiglio, Kelly Mulligan and Nicole Grossbard.

When you've had much success as Lorraine has, it's not easy singling out one or two games as the most memorable, but she rates the second state championship with Albertus as one of the top accomplishments in her personal highlight reel. In that game, the Falcons edged Queensbury on its home court in a down-to-the-wire thriller. Both of the Section 1 championships she won at Pearl River remain special, too, and "the icing on the cake" was reaching the State final four coaching her alma mater.

Lorraine, who is 55, resides in Park Ridge, N.J., with her husband, Jamie, daughter Annie, 24, a second-grade teacher in Fair Lawn, N.J., and son Bill, 22, who is pursuing a master's degree in special education at Rowan University in New Jersey.

Lorraine pays tribute to all of her assistant coaches "for their tireless efforts and dedication to the programs," especially Nancy Brezovsky, Kait Page, Tricia Flynn, Kathleen Finnegan and Brenda King. "I would also like to thank all of the former players for their blood, sweat and tears," she says. "They are the reason I am receiving this honor."





RICHARD SCHUMACHER

Suffern High School Class of 1966

During the 1960's multiple sport athletes were more of the norm than the oddity. But multiple sport All County athletes were something special. Richard Schumacher was something special; a two time All County football player, a two time Rockland County heavyweight wrestling champion, plus a Section 9 champion and the All County catcher on Suffern's Rockland County Championship baseball team. On that basis alone Rich should be considered for this prestigious honor. It's hard to believe that his wrestling coach, Guy Guccione, could be right when he stated, "Many very good high school athletes don't reach their full potential until college and beyond. Rich is clearly one of these athletes." Coach Guccione was right about Schumacher; Rich went on to have an even more outstanding college and professional career.

As the product of the legendary Suffern High School wrestling program, Rich was recruited to wrestle at East Stroudsburg State College in Pennsylvania. During his four year career at East Stroudsburg State, Rich's accomplishments were amazing. He won numerous collegiate tournaments including, the US Naval Academy Plebe Tournament, twice the East Stroudsburg Open, twice the Pennsylvania Conference Champion, and the Wilkes Open. During his sophomore year Rich had a dual meet record of 15-0, and finished with a three year varsity career overall record of 82-7-2, with 31 pins. In 1968, Rich placed 5th in the nation at the Division I NCAA wrestling tournament, earning him All American status. In 1969 he was a college All American, placing 4th in the NCAA College division at heavyweight. In 1970, Rich won the College Division Championship in the heavyweight class, and placed 5th in the Division I NCAA wrestling tournament held at Northwestern University. Rich was named All American on four different occasions and was selected to participate in the National Wrestling Coaches Association All Star meet held at Iowa State University in 1970. Being one of the top heavyweight wrestlers in the United States, Rich was invited to the USA Olympic trials held in Ames, Iowa. At graduation in 1970 Rich was named the wrestling team MVP and the East Stroudsburg State Male Athlete of the Year.

After college graduation Rich was named the head wrestling coach of Bucknell University in Lewisburg, Pennsylvania, a position he held until 1973 when Rich decided to return to competitive wrestling. While coaching the Bucknell team, Rich compiled a 22-21 record and one Middle Atlantic Conference champion. From 1973-1976 Rich wrestled for the New York Athletic Club where they became the Eastern AAU Champions and the National AAU Team Champions. In 1976 Rich



returned to the coaching ranks as the Assistant Coach for his alma mater, East Stroudsburg University. From 1976 to 1980 Rich coached five All Americans, and four ElWA champions. The team had a dual meet record of 49-18-3 while Rich was on staff there.

In 1981 Rich left the coaching ranks and went into private business, first working in the textile industry for twenty years, and then mortgage banking for twelve more. During most of that time Rich maintained contact with the sport of wrestling as a referee from 1976 to 1986, and as the director, or co-director, of the East Stroudsburg Open Wrestling Championships from 1973 to 1983. In 2007 the lure of wrestling coaching and his love of the sport found Rich as the Assistant Wrestling Coach at Collins Hill High School in Georgia. For the two years Rich was at Collins Hill they were the two time State champions. While there he coached several Georgia High School 6A place winners and champions. In 2009 Rich became the Head Wrestling Coach at Meadowcreek High School in Norcross, Georgia. In 2011 Rich was named the "Gwinnett County Coach of the Year" for his 27 win season by the Gwinnett Daily Post and reached the 100 dual meet win mark in his fourth season. This past season "Coach Schumacher" had two wrestlers place in the Georgia State Tournament.

Rich currently lives in Lawrenceville, Georgia with his wife Karen. They have four children: Kristi Celentano, 32, an attorney, Michael Celentano 31, a sales executive, Ryan Schumacher, 25, who works for Turner Broadcasting/Time Warner in the research and development department and Casey Ann Schumacher, 22, a senior at Georgia States University and graduating in May. In a recent communication Rich stated, "I am loving coaching. It does keep you young and I cannot imagine retirement – this is my retirement, although I have put a time limit to retire from teaching in 2017."



THADDEUS WILSON

Nanuet High School Class of 1969


The hurdles have always attracted some of the best athletes in track and field, demanding as they do an amalgam of speed, strength, agility and technique. The high hurdles had just been introduced as an event in RCPSAL competition when Thad Wilson arrived on the Rockland track scene as a Nanuet High School freshman in 1966. But by the time he graduated in 1969, a perfect storm of conditions had propelled Thad to a storybook career that featured six Rockland County titles and three county records. Thirty-three years later, he began writing a second chapter to that tale – in masters track & field competition – which continues to this day.

Thad was the first Rockland hurdler to break the 15-second barrier in the 120-yard high hurdles, clocking 14.9 seconds as a senior in the 1969 County meet. He also was the first Rockland timber-topper to eclipse the 20-second threshold in the 180-yard low hurdles. His mark of 19.4 remained on the books after the 180 lows were replaced by the 330 intermediate hurdles in 1974. He shattered both hurdle marks by six-tenths of a second, a gaping margin in a sprint race.

The perfect storm swirled from a favorable confluence of coach, athlete and program. Coach Dave Hanson was in the midst of building a track dynasty at Nanuet, replete with a fledgling winter track program, when Thad entered the picture as a callow junior high student with talent that Hanson knew how to tap.

"Running hurdles was not my first choice of things I wanted to do in track and field," Thad says. "When I left Highview Elementary School for seventh grade I thought I could be a high jumper and a sprinter. Coach Hanson had other plans for me. On the bus to my first junior-high meet, with Kakiat Junior High in Spring Valley, he asked me if I wanted to run the 80-yard hurdles that day. Coach Hanson had been my 7th & 8th grade football coach, so maybe he saw something during football season that identified me as a hurdler. I had seen the hurdles out on the track, but had never gone over one before that day. I won the race and hurdles became my primary event."

Thad recalls attempting to master the high hurdles during a period when nobody in Rockland had yet become well-versed in skimming the 39-inch barriers at full throttle. "I wasn't too good at it, but neither was anybody else in the county," he says. "We were all learning how to run the race. I remember that my stride between hurdles was too short and I had to take four steps instead of three. Much of my success in the high hurdles can be credited to the winter track program at Nanuet started by Coach Hanson. I was able to work on form and technique during the winter in preparation for the spring season."



All the training eventually reaped huge dividends for Thad. He won County titles in both hurdle races his junior and senior years, and also ran on Nanuet's winning 880-yard relay both years. He teamed with John Poletto, Frank Bria and Fred Hodges to set a County record of 1:31.1 in the relay. Thad did not lose an RCPSAL dual meet in the 180 lows for three years, and in the '69 season won every individual event he contested in dual meets: 12 in the high hurdles, 10 in the lows and two in the triple jump. He added three Section 9 Class B crowns and three State Qualifier gold medals to his total, and shared the Section 9 record in the 180 lows at 19.7.

In the fall, Thad donned football pads and earned three varsity letters as a defensive back for the Golden Knights. He served as team co-captain and gained All-County recognition his senior year.

Now fast forward to 2002. Thad had gotten into coaching track at St. Bonaventure High School in Ventura, Calif., after a decorated career in the U.S. Navy. "When I started coaching, I was showing the kids some hurdle drills and realized that I still had the muscle memory to run hurdles," he says. "I was in fairly good shape because I stayed in shape during my time in the Navy. I started doing track workouts after the high school team had finished their workout."

And so began the masters (age 40 and older) track & field era for Thad Wilson, an epoch that shows no signs of abating. From 2002 to 2014 spanning the 50-54, 55-59 and 60-64 age groups, he has won 30 – yes, 30 – USA Track & Field national masters titles as well as 10 World masters championships, and has set two world records for his age group. Just last month he captured the 60-meter hurdles title at both the USATF national and World indoor championships, and added a gold medal in the Worlds 4x200-meter relay.

In 2011, at age 60, Thad had a breakout year in masters competition. He captured the 100- and 300-meter hurdles and ran on the world-record-setting M60-64 4x100 relay (47.93) at the World outdoor championships, and set a global best in the

M60-64 100 hurdles (14.37) at the USA outdoor nationals – his sixth straight age-group title in that event. He also swept the 60-meter hurdles, long jump and pentathlon at the USA indoor nationals, and was selected as one of the M60-74 Masters Track & Field Age Group Athletes of the Year.

In addition to his 2011 success, Thad won the M55-59 100 hurdles at the 2009 World Championships, the M55-59 100 hurdles and 400 hurdles at the 2007 World Championships, the M60-64 100 hurdles and 300 hurdles at the 2013 World Championships, and has earned numerous silver and bronze medals in the national and world championship meets.


Thad enlisted in the Navy in March 1970 and served until his retirement from active duty in November 1996 as a Master Chief Petty Officer, the highest enlisted rank. During his almost 27 years of service he was assigned to nine different shore commands and five shipboard commands. While assigned to sea he made four Western Pacific deployments (including Vietnam), two Mediterranean deployments and one North Atlantic deployment. He has visited six continents and more than 20 countries, and has garnered a plethora of awards, including the Meritorious Service medal, two Navy Commendation medals, two Navy Achievement medals, the Combat Action Ribbon, Joint Meritorious Unit Award, six Good Conduct medals, two National Defense Service medals, the

Armed Forces Expeditionary medal, the Republic of Vietnam Campaign medal, and many others.

Thad is 63 years old and lives in Oxnard, Calif. He works as an engineer for AdvantEdge Technology Inc. supporting the U.S. Navy at the Port Hueneme Division Naval Surface Warfare Center. He and his wife, Patricia (Smith) Wilson, a native of Spring Valley, have two children, Anne M. Tilghman and Thaddeus B. Wilson Jr., and five grandchildren – Tori, Kendall, Trinity, Imani and Thaddeus III.

Thad was elected to the Nanuet High School Sports Hall of Fame in 2005 and the Rockland County Track & Field Hall of Fame in 2012.





Joseph Holland Lifetime Achievement Award

Al Witt

Former Journal-News Photographer


Al Witt got sports shots that no one else was getting. As a photographer for The Journal-News through the 1960s, '70s and '80s, Al captured the drama of athletic competition from angles and with techniques that were considered novel for their time: a long-jumper's spiked shoes headed straight for the camera lens on descent into the sand pit, a shot-putter poised to uncoil, his throwing arm looming large in the frame; basketball players vying under the hoop, unhindered by Witt's presence because he used no flash — "available light" in photographers' parlance — while snapping off his gem.

"I worked in a business where there was constantly something going on," says Al, who was a general-assignment photographer for the original Rockland Journal-News from about 1960 to 1989. "I shot everything, but it was really a joy to photograph sports. It was exciting. All the kids were trying like hell to be No. 1, whether it was a 50-yard dash, tennis, baseball, whatever. The intensity of the kids, the tension ... they were working hard on their competition."

A native of Yonkers, Al graduated from Mount St. Michael Academy of the Bronx in 1940 and served as a U.S. Army tank transporter during World War II. His ability to work well under duress – a trait that would manifest itself countless times while photographing sports – was first revealed during the Battle of the Bulge in 1944. Al was caught in the sudden first hours of fighting while delivering materiel during that crucial battle in the Ardennes region, yet he hunkered down, gauged his opportunity to finish his delivery and successfully completed his mission.

While in Europe during the war, Al took up photography to capture the landscape. When he returned to civilian life, he landed a job at Macy's working in the camera department from 1946 to 1950. His Journal-News career came about after he sent a photograph to Journal-News editor Norman Baker. "It was something I thought would be good for a feature story in the paper," Al says. "Norm liked my work and offered me an opportunity to head up The Journal-News photo department." And thus began his illustrious tenure at the newspaper, shooting everything from pre-publicity shots, to spot-news photos like fires and accidents, to sports, which proved a forte.

"Whatever sport Al Witt was assigned, from pre-Little League to high school to semi-pro, he tried to capture the excitement, the opportunity/ loss of opportunity, the pathos, the drama, the tears of joy of sports in Rockland," wrote Arthur H. Gunther III, who was a Journal-News photographer, writer and editor



for more than four decades. He broke in at the paper as a cub photographer under Al Witt.

"Many a day at the old Journal-News,' Gunther added, "it was sports, not general news, that carried the paper, that made it interesting for the moms and pops, coaches, fans and, most of all, players in sports-minded Rockland County. Al Witt was a legend in his time as a sports photog."

Al was recognized for his excellence in shooting sports, earning third place in a New York State Associated Press competition for a photo from a local baseball game, and receiving an appreciation award in 1988 for his long and meritorious service to The Journal-News and the athletes of Rockland County.

After retiring from the paper, Al volunteered at the Rockland Interfaith Breakfast Program at United Church of Spring Valley for close to 25 years. "I cooked pancakes every Tuesday for a hundred people," says Al. "I was happy to do it."

Aloysius Witt turns 91 years young in June. He gave up bocce ball just a few years ago, relinquished his driver's license recently and now uses a cane, but is enjoying life to the greatest extent possible, he says. He lives in New City with his daughter, Marie, and son, Al, and has two other grown children, Lois and Alyse. Another daughter, Nancy Rita, passed away some 10 years ago. His first wife, Angelina, died in 1986 and his second wife, Alicia, lives in Florida.
