left their mark in basketball and multi-sports; three track and field stars who set records in pole vaulting, long distance, cross country, sprints and jumping; two all-around athletes, one who excelled in golf and skiing, the other in football, wrestling and baseball; and an outstanding coach and educator with 50 years of service at Rockland Community College. Rockland County continues to produce outstanding athletes year after year, so there is no shortage of qualified candidates for future years.

Sadly, this past year we lost two distinguished members of our RCSHOF induction class: Rich Conklin, inducted individually in 2000 and again in 2018 as coach of the undefeated 1989 Nanuet High School football team; and Ed Kolakowski, a 2014 inductee who was a basketball and softball coach at Suffern High School and 30-year football official.

A little less than four months from now – July 29, to be precise – we will honor two outstanding teams at a New York Boulders baseball game at Clover Stadium in Pomona. The teams to be honored are: the 1969-70 Clarkstown boys' basketball team, coached by legendary Hall of Famer Ed McGrath; and the 1993 North Rockland football team, the New York State Class A champions, coached by the dynamic and successful Hall of Famer Joe Casarella.

ENSHRINEMENT REQUIREMENTS

The Rockland County Sports Hall of Fame was established to honor outstanding sportsmen and sportswomen, living and deceased, who have gained prominence while residing or competing in, or have brought recognition to Rockland County. To be considered for nomination to the Hall of Fame, candidates must meet the following criteria:

- A. Attain prominence in sports as an athlete, coach, manager, official, owner, writer, broadcaster or supporter.
- B. Reside or have resided in Rockland County, competed here at the time of their prominence, or brought fame to Rockland County as a result of their accomplishments.
- C.Be a person of integrity and good character.
- D. Candidates cannot be considered until 10 years after their high school class graduation, except in special cases.

Our committee encourages the public to send athletic resumes/nominations of prospective candidates to Screening Committee chairman Bill Rubbert, 189 Ridge Road, Valley Cottage, New York 10989. Nominees are reviewed by this committee and, if accepted, voted upon for enshrinement by the committee as a whole.

The Hall of Fame Committee holds monthly meetings the first Tuesday of the month from October to May. Anyone wishing to join the organization should write to Chairman Pete Scheibner, 1 Captain McGovern Drive, Stony Point, NY 10980, or e-mail him at scheibnp@msn.com.

Each inductee in the Rockland County Sports Hall of Fame receives a commemorative trophy and is further honored with an individual plaque, which is given to the inductee's high school for public display.

The Rockland County Sports Hall of Fame is more than awards and trophies and dinners, however. It is really about people — Rockland County people who have had an impact in the world of sports. A total of 303 have been honored since the hall's inception in 1974.

The Hall of Fame has evolved from those early beginnings to become a recognized presence in Rockland County athletics. In addition to its annual dinner, where it honors new inductees, the hall makes sizable donations to worthwhile local organizations and charities. Included among these donations have been cash gifts to:

Lance ARIETTA

TAPPAN ZEE HIGH SCHOOL CLASS OF 1976

Lance Arietta dedicated himself to being a champion pole vaulter. He parlayed a relentless work ethic, competitive streak, ample self-confidence and a showman's flair to secure a berth in the pantheon of all-time greats in Rockland track & field. He won two New York State championships, set the indoor and outdoor State records, and added an Eastern States title to his gold-medal haul.

Eccentric Outlook Well-Suited to Pole Vaulting

There's something about contorting your body upside down in midair that tends to make pole vaulters different than the rest of us. Call them eccentrics or daredevils, but there's no denying some of the best athletes in track & field wind up with a pole in their hands and a notion to soar into the clouds.

Is there any doubt Lance Arietta fit the mold of a classic pole vaulter? Here's a guy who hitchhiked along the Palisades Parkway to West Point – in a blizzard, no less – with 15-foot poles on each shoulder, just to get in his daily practice session. He lived under the bleachers at the Abilene Christian track for six months, again to find some quality training. He ran brutal hills with Kenyan elites in Texas and Mexico to build leg strength and endurance for his specialty. He even walked on his hands up hills at Tappan Zee, with his brother Rudy holding his legs up, to strengthen his shoulders for vaulting.

"The only person crazy enough to do these things was me," said Lance, a left-handed vaulter who personified the southpaw's reputation for flakiness. He offered these comments in 2007, when he was inducted into the Rockland County Track & Field Hall of Fame. "You find different ways to train so it doesn't get boring doing the same thing day after day. I went wherever I could go to jump and train."

Catapulting to the Top

Life as a vaulter was anything but boring for Lance. What started as a way to one-up his brothers playing high jump in their Blauvelt back yard turned into an infatuation with vertical lift that thrust the Flying Dutchman to unprecedented heights. He won the New York State outdoor crown as a junior and the State indoor



title as a senior. In 1976, he broke both the indoor and outdoor New York State records. His outdoor clearance of 15 feet 10 inches toppled the previous mark of 15-4 ¼ set in 1974 by Andy Pintus of Half Hollow Hills. His indoor record of 15-4 ¼ eclipsed the prior standard of 15-0 set in '74 by Paul Flint of James I. O'Neill in Highland Falls. Lance's marks were not eclipsed by a Rockland athlete for 17 years. He still ranks No. 2 all-time among Rockland vaulters indoors and out, behind only Ryan Dall of North Rockland, a national champion in 1993.

Lance was Eastern States outdoor gold medalist his senior year, finally getting the better of archrival Bill Hartley of Southern Regional (Manahawkin, NJ), to whom Lance had finished second two straight years. "That was a beautiful moment," said Lance, who vaulted 15-10 that day. He also placed second (to Hartley) at the Penn Relays, and qualified for the 1976 Golden West Invitational in Sacramento, Calif., where he tied for fifth with Billy Olson, who set the world indoor record at 19-5 ½ a decade later. The Golden West meet served as the de facto national scholastic championships before the advent of a national meet much later.

Back-Yard Beginnings, Rapid Progression

Lance came a long way from the 9-year-old who competed against his older brothers Rudy and Wayne in a crude high-jump setup of sticks for standards and crossbar. One day he impulsively grabbed a larger stick from nearby woods and "vaulted" over the stick crossbar, thus christening his pole vaulting career. "Whenever I

went over and it didn't fall off, it was a good feeling," he remembered. By eighth grade he was clearing 10 feet with a metal pole, then came the fiberglass pole and improvement by quantum leaps – 13 feet as a sophomore, 14 feet as a junior, and 15-10 as a senior.

Lance pursued his specialty with a passion, watching a videotape of Olympic champion Bob Seagren "till it broke" and attending vaulting camps by Seagren and Steve Smith – the first U.S. vaulter to clear 18 feet – for two summers in Maryland. He also found guidance and support from Tim St. Lawrence, the former state record-holder from Suffern and coaching guru, and brother Rudy, who studied the event and imparted invaluable advice on technique.

Pole vaulters need to be fast and strong, and while Lance would not win many footraces, he was exceptionally strong at 5-foot-9 and 145 pounds. Walking up flights of stairs on your hands will get you strong in a hurry. When he went to college at the University of Texas at El Paso, gymnastics and trampoline work were integrated into his training routine, and the hills he ran in Texas and across the border in Mexico kept his legs strong when he

wasn't doing vaulting-specific training. "I never had an off-season," he said.

Lance attended UTEP for a year, followed by one-year stints at Miami Dade Junior College in Florida and American River College in Sacramento. He returned to UTEP to train and compete but serious knee and back injuries ultimately derailed his vaulting career. He retired with a best of 17-feet, 1/4-inch, good enough to qualify for the U.S. Olympic Trials. Lance later took up competitive bodybuilding and won some local and regional honors.

Sadly, Lance passed away in 2017 at age 59. He had moved to Florida in 1989 with his partner, Carmen, residing in Coconut Creek. Lance had one son, Brandon, 29. Lance worked as a transportation coordinator for the Iron Mountain records management company, supervising a fleet of 20 drivers.

Lance is the second member of the Arietta family to earn enshrinement into the Rockland County Sports Hall of Fame. A cousin on his father's side, Wil Arietta, who was a 1941 Nyack High School graduate, gained election in 1985.

NYACK HIGH SCHOOL CLASS OF 1972

Dave Billings ushered in a golden era for Rockland County distance runners. In the 1970s, Rockland groomed a succession of state-caliber long distance runners, and Dave kick-started the evolution with a string of barrier-breaking performances.

Before Dave came along, the County record in the two-mile run was 9 minutes 50.0 seconds, set in 1970. Over a two-year period, Dave chopped an astounding 38 seconds off that mark. His clocking of 9:12.0 to win the 1972 outdoor New York State championship established a state public high school athletic association (NYSPHSAA) record and cemented his legend in Rockland track lore.


Dave was on fire during the 1972 spring track season. After a knee injury playing basketball sidelined him from February to early April, Dave plunged back into a ferocious training regimen engineered by Mike Redmond, a Nyack College All-America runner who had convinced him to try running two years before. "I was a defeated puppy with the injury, but Mike gave me back that confidence," Dave says.

The result? Four meets, four County records, one State record: County meet, 9:22.4, breaking his own County-meet record of 9:30.2 and County overall standard of 9:22.6 set in '71; Section 9 meet, 9:20.9; State Qualifier, 9:14.1; and State meet, 9:12.0.

Goodbye Hoops, Hello Track, XC

Dave was an unlikely candidate to become a recordbreaking state champion. Beset by what he called a troubled youth, he endured the death of his twin sister, Connie, at age 13 due to cancer. He also had a rebellious streak. At the end of his sophomore year at Nyack High School, he received a school suspension for an altercation with a teacher, and the detentions carried over to his junior year.

The transformation from uninspired basketball player to standout runner began the summer between 10th and 11th grade, when Redmond spotted Dave playing basketball on the outdoor courts at Nyack College. Redmond saw distance-running potential in Dave's tall, thin frame. "He told me, 'I could make you one of the best runners in the state,'" Dave recounts. "He would pick me up at 5:30 each morning and by 6 a.m. we'd be running six miles."



When the fall season rolled around, Dave asked Nyack coach Joe McDowell if he could come out for the cross country team. Mindful of Dave's discipline problems in school, McDowell was skeptical, but eventually relented. "Since we had only six guys, Joe McDowell said that OK, I could be his seventh man," Dave remembers with a chuckle.

Logging as much as 18 miles a day, Dave had found his athletic calling. He won the first cross country race he entered, a dual meet versus Suffern, and was second in the County meet to Tappan Zee's Joe Olcese. In the spring, Dave was the County's premier two-miler and shadowed Olcese in the mile. In his senior year, he went undefeated in cross country as he swept the County, Section 9 and New York State Class B titles, won his division in the Eastern States meet and captured the AAU junior (19 and younger) title over a 4-mile course at Van Cortlandt Park. [In 2000 Dave was elected to the Rockland County All-Century Cross Country team.]

College Success & Answering Call of the Ministry

After graduating from Nyack High in 1972, Dave enrolled at Nyack College, which is not surprising since his parents, Nathaniel and Virginia, both were professors and missionaries at the college, a Christian missionary institute. At Nyack College, Dave continued his successful cross country career (Nyack had no track program), twice earning NAIA All-America honors. In his sophomore year, he captured the National Christian College Athletic Association championship. Dave also won three conference titles and twice earned the Outstanding College Athlete award at Nyack.

After stints at Taylor University in Indiana and Monmouth College in New Jersey, Dave returned to Nyack and graduated in 1978. Following the career path of his father, an ordained minister, Dave obtained a master's degree at the Alliance Theological Seminary in Nyack in 1979. From 1979 to '87 he worked for church-affiliated organizations, including a fulfilling role as executive director for a youth ministry in Ocean Grove, NJ.

Still in his running prime during that period, Dave established himself as one of the finest road-racers in the metropolitan region and southern New Jersey for distances ranging from the 5K (3.1 miles), 5 miles and 10K (6.2 miles) up to the marathon. Among his noteworthy efforts was an excellent clocking of 2 hours 27 minutes 13 seconds in the Jersey Shore Marathon, his debut at the 26.2-mile distance. That performance ranks in the top five all-time for Rockland running alumni.

Around that time Dave began coaching other runners. He has since coached four high school teams – St. John's Vianney in New Jersey, Seymour HS and Christian Heritage HS in Connecticut, and Mount Academy in Esopus, NY – as well as two college teams, Nyack and St. Thomas Aquinas, several post-collegiate elite runners, and others just training for local races or trying to get in shape through running.

In 1987, Dave's vocational calling took him to Laconia, NH, where he presided as pastor of the Christian Missionary Alliance (CMA) church for four years. He then helped found a CMA church in Oxford, CT, and led that congregation for eight years before a one-year stint as pastor in Lombard, IL.

Returning to Rockland and Orange

The new millennium brought Dave back to Rockland County. After spending the first four years of his life in the Ivory Coast in West Africa, where his parents were missionaries, Dave moved with his family to Nyack at age 4. He served as pastor at the Evangelical Free Church of America in New City from 2000 to 2006, and has been pastor for the past 15 years at the Middletown Alliance Church, now Crossroads Church, CMA, in Middletown, NY.

Dave is owner/operator of Lifeworks International, which helps people develop their potential through life coaching, leadership coaching and coaching runners. He is a life and leadership coach/country coordinator to CMA International workers in the Middle East and Central Asia – Russia, Ukraine, Jordan, Lebanon, Syria, Palestine and Israel.

In the local community, Dave serves as chaplain and running coach of the Run with God training group for runners and walkers, which he co-founded. The group's motto is "connecting fitness and faith." He is also Run/Walk training group coach and a board member at the Middletown YMCA, and formerly served as vice president, chaplain and running coach for the Orange Runners Club. He has helped direct and consult for various races in Orange County, including the popular Classic 10K (formerly Orange Classic), and still maintains connections to his Rockland running roots as a member of the Rockland Road Runners club.

Dave, who is 69, and his wife, Carol, have been married for 46 years and reside in Wallkill Township in Orange County. They have four grown children: twins Bjorn and Kristin, 45; Leif, 42; and Hans, 40, and five grandchildren ranging in age from 12 to 17.

Dave was inducted into the Rockland County Track & Field Hall of Fame in 2005, and was enshrined in the Nyack High School Athletics Hall of Fame in 2017.

ALBERTUS MAGNUS HIGH SCHOOL CLASS OF 1974

Mary Brechbiel was shooting jump shots when the other girls were still hoisting set shots. On the basketball court, she was always a step ahead of the opposition and made her Albertus Magnus teammates better with her advanced all-around skills, honed from playing against her four older brothers while growing up in Haverstraw. During her four-year varsity career for the Falcons, she developed into the dominant player on scholastic basketball courts in Westchester and Rockland counties. And she continued that streak of excellence during a Hall of Fame career at Mercy College.

During the early years of Title IX, which opened avenues of athletic opportunity previously unavailable to girls, Mary paved the way for local female basketball players to aspire to higher levels of play and the chance for college scholarships. Indeed, Mary earned the first athletic scholarship awarded to a female basketball player at Mercy.

Statistically, we will never know the full extent of Mary's superiority because individual records were not kept during her first three seasons, when Albertus played in a Westchester County league comprising Catholic, parochial and private schools. Her coach during her sophomore and junior years, Meg Feerick, estimated Mary averaged more than 25 points a game in those two seasons, and she was removed from games early en route to blowout victories by Albertus. She led the Falcons to the league championship in the 1971-72 campaign.

Cementing Legacy as Impact Player in Rockland

By her senior year, Albertus had joined the Rockland County Public School Athletic League (RCPSAL) and Mary, the team captain, wasted little time establishing herself as the centerpiece of a squad that lost only one game the entire season. She set Rockland records by averaging 24.2 points per game and pouring in 44 points in one game, versus North Rockland. There's little doubt Mary could have been a 1,000-point career scorer had records been maintained her first three years.



If there was an all-time Rockland girls' basketball team, Mary would surely land a spot on the first team, according to many local sports observers. When The Journal-News invited readers in 1988 to submit names of the best athletes ever from each Rockland school, Mary received the most votes of any Albertus female athlete.

In the newspaper article on Albertus's "Best-Ever" female athlete, tributes came flowing in for the versatile 5-foot-5 guard. "Mary was ahead of her time," said Tom Collins, then the Albertus athletic director and boys' basketball coach. "She came from a family of fine athletes" – brothers George, Peter, Frank and Danny – "and she followed right in their footsteps."

"There really wasn't anything she couldn't do on the basketball court," said Coach Feerick. "She was unstoppable."

"If you were on the other team, you had to be in awe of her," said former teammate Patti Walsh Lyver. Despite Mary's ascendancy, "she was never out there to be the best player. She was a team player. She would pass off on shots you know she could've made."

"The things I did, I guess people weren't used to seeing in girls' sports," Mary said. "There was a group of seven or eight of us at Albertus that loved to play sports ... we would just go out and have fun and play."

Seamless Transition from Albertus to Mercy

The good times continued to roll for Mary at Mercy College, located in Dobbs Ferry in Westchester. She finished her four-year collegiate career as the school's all-time leader in scoring, with 1,534 points, and steals, 488; as well as fourth in assists, 414, and ninth in rebounds, 686. During her senior year she played a major role in Mercy's advancement to the championship game of the Eastern Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW) Northeast Regional tournament. She scored 29 points to pace the Flyers to an 89-60 decision over Brown, and scored her 1,500th point during Mercy's 89-69 semifinal victory over Yale.


After graduating from Mercy in 1978 with a bachelor's degree in criminal justice, Mary continued to work at

St. Agatha's Home for children in Nanuet, where she had worked throughout college. She went on to join the New York City Police Department in 1980, starting as a police officer in the Bronx, moving up the ranks to detective and detective sergeant and later assigned to the Manhattan Special Victims squad.

Mary retired in 2001 and became a substitute teacher in the North Rockland school district. She was the assistant girls' varsity basketball coach at North Rockland High School from 2001 to 2008 and assistant varsity softball coach in 2009-2010.

These days Mary, who is 66, lives in Myrtle Beach, SC, with her husband of 24 years, Bob Agnetti. She has three grown stepchildren and eight grandchildren.

SPRING VALLEY HIGH SCHOOL CLASS OF 1981

Where to begin with Heidi Higgins? Her athletic career was marked by a pair of firsts: first girl to play baseball in the Monsey Little League, and first girl to play on a boys' high school baseball team in New York State. But it was also marked by a record-setting career as a soccer goalkeeper for Spring Valley: she still holds five Rockland County records, including saves in a game (30), season (254) and career (504).

Wait, there's more. How about her two All-County selections for basketball, helping lead the Tigers to the 1979 Section 9 championship and 1980 Rockland County title? Or her All-County nod and team captaincy in softball? Let's not forget her four years of full-scholarship basketball at Nazareth College, where she is still one of the all-time single season (251) and career (741) rebounding leaders and spearheaded the No. 8-ranked Golden Flyers to the NAIA national tournament in Kansas City.

And here's a fun fact you probably didn't know: Heidi, a former NYPD detective and social worker, once appeared on "60 Minutes" for her work in getting a homeless veteran, "The Wild Man of W. 96th Street," into appropriate mental health care after he wreaked havoc in the streets of New York. She received an award from New York City Mayor David Dinkins and NYPD Commissioner Ray Kelly, and was featured on the Times Square Trinitron for a week.

Breaking the Mold: A Girl on the Boys' Team

That's a lot to digest. Maybe we should start with an appraisal by one of her teammates at Spring Valley, Charlotte Smith Bonomolo, who cited Heidi's "spirit, her desire to win, her never-give-up attitude about sports and life." Heidi had to mine all of that spirit, desire and resiliency when she tried out for the freshman boys' baseball team. New York State required demanding physical tests that Heidi had to pass before gaining eligibility to play. The tests included an obstacle course, sprinting and long-distance running, pullups, pushups, situps, squat thrusts, suicide runs, catching balls at high speed, throwing at a target, running the bases in the allotted time, and proper technique in sliding into a base under the tag. If she failed any one of these tests, she failed overall.

Guess what? "I passed with flying colors," Heidi said gleefully. "It became a personal challenge that made me want



to play on the team even more." Thereafter followed an evaluation by the state-certified instructor to determine whether Heidi was psychologically sound enough to participate in this "contact" sport with boys her own age. After answering a series of probing questions to the satisfaction of the evaluator, Heidi finally was deemed worthy of playing baseball with her male peers, and was quickly welcomed into the fold by her new teammates.

A Player For All Seasons

All told, Heidi participated in 12 seasons of sports at Spring Valley, playing on 10 varsity teams, one JV team and one freshman team encompassing girls' basketball, softball, soccer and track, and boys' baseball. How much did she love the competition? Her comment about playing soccer goalie is telling: "My favorite was defending the goal for a penalty kick. Just me and the net. It was such a rush."

Heidi played center and forward in basketball, first base in baseball, and third base, shortstop and first base in softball. In soccer she made first-team All-County goalkeeper her junior year and second team her senior year, while in basketball she made second-team All-County both years. Heidi was coached by Paul Sbrollini and Paul Shapiro in basketball, Lou Kliewe and Shapiro in soccer, and Cliff Hillman in softball.

Heidi considers herself fortunate to have played with a roster of high-caliber female athletes at Spring Valley, teammates like Janet Pia Grahn, Nancy Connors Brezovsky, Rhonda Carden, Charlotte Smith Bonomolo, and MariEllyn Dykstra Thurston Donnellan, among others. Many went on to play

competitively in college and receive scholarships. Heidi also relished playing against top-flight competitors such as Carol Duke of Tappan Zee, Christine McGuinness, Eileen and Cathy Sullivan from Albertus Magnus and Denise McGuire from Pearl River. Several of her basketball and softball opponents wound up as her teammates in summer leagues. "Many of us are still friends after all these years," she said. "Some of us were in each other's wedding parties too!"

Support From Those Who Care

Heidi singles out Lorraine Guerci Moylan and Paul Shapiro as two influential mentors in her life. As Spring Valley's JV girls' basketball coach during Heidi's senior year, Lorraine helped Heidi navigate the challenging college selection process. "Not only did I respect her as a coach but as an athlete and a person. Lorraine is someone to emulate as she is intelligent, an exceptional coach, a tough competitor, an athlete and good role model for young women." When Heidi returned to Spring Valley in 1985 to serve for one year as assistant coach for the girls' basketball team, she had the privilege of coaching alongside Shapiro, who had coached her in basketball and soccer. "He is one of the best men I've ever had the pleasure of knowing," said Heidi, who has remained good friends with Shapiro. "He was a good teacher and coach but most of all a solid human being filled with compassion and decency."

Heidi received numerous college scholarship offers for basketball, softball or soccer but ultimately accepted a full basketball scholarship to Nazareth College in Rochester, N.Y. At Nazareth, she started all four years, scoring 895 career points and averaging 13 points a game. She was chosen as NAIA Player of the Week three times, and was team captain and MVP her senior year. Heidi graduated with a bachelor's degree in social work. "Choosing Nazareth was a good fit for me," she said. "It was a small college but very competitive and well respected both academically and athletically."

Fun fact No. 2: Heidi graduated college with Jeff Van Gundy, the former New York Knicks coach and current NBA broadcaster. Van Gundy was point guard for Nazareth's men's team, which played in Division III.

Heidi continued playing basketball and softball after college, competing in circuits including the Kingsbridge Softball League, White Plains Women's Basketball League, Empire State Games basketball, and the NYPD Commissioner's Softball League. She also coached and taught at various basketball camps and leagues, including the Girls' All-Star Basketball Camp, CYO Basketball Camp in Peekskill, NY, swimming for the NYS Special Olympics.

Police Career: Maintaining the Family Tradition

After her one-year stint as assistant coach at Spring Valley, Heidi entered the NYPD Police Academy and became a

police officer in 1986, the fourth generation of her family to wear the vestments of New York's Finest, dating back to 1880 (with a fifth-generation Higgins currently serving). After seven years she was promoted to detective, a position that was tailor-made for her. She spoke of "so many incredible experiences," including a stint as an undercover prostitute.

Then there was that turn in the spotlight taming "The Wild Man of W. 96th Street." The homeless veteran was an addict who went on rampages after bingeing on drugs and alcohol. He nearly killed people on numerous occasions, including throwing a child in front of an oncoming utility truck. Heidi took a personal interest in the case since it was in her precinct in Manhattan and she had experience as a social worker. "He was falling through the cracks of our system," she said. "He was a vet and our responsibility as a society was to help him and make sure he was not a danger to himself or others." Heidi had to go to court to get the man placed in a mandatory mental hospital, Creedmor Psychiatric Center in Queens, NY. It was a precedentsetting case that received ample air time on "60 Minutes" in a much-publicized segment hosted by CBS news journalist Leslie Stahl.

Heidi retired in 2006 as a detective in the Community Affairs Division. Her retirement was hastened by illnesses stemming from her three months of work as a first responder at Ground Zero after the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001. Heidi suffers from COPD and pulmonary hypertension. Last fall she experienced heart failure from long-term use of steroids, which are prescribed to improve breathing function but weakened her heart over a long duration. She continues to undergo pulmonary rehabilitation to regain greater lung capacity.

"It's been and it's going to be a long road but I don't have any regrets because I would do it all over again if such circumstances should arise," Heidi asserted. "I took an oath and I will always be true to that oath, which I raised my hand and swore to uphold way back in July of '86."

After college, Heidi lived in the Bronx for 13 years before moving with her husband, Robert Elie Sermabekian, to Sloatsburg in 1999. The couple moved to Wilmington, NC, five years ago and "we are loving every minute of it," Heidi said.

Heidi, who is 60, and Elie have been married 28 years. She is stepmother to his three children. Despite her health setbacks, she maintains a sunny outlook on life and lives each day to the fullest. "I have been so blessed in my life to have so many incredible experiences, opportunities and achievements," she said. "I follow the old Irish proverb, 'Do not resent growing old for many are denied the privilege."

NORTH ROCKLAND HIGH SCHOOL CLASS OF 1986

No one could ever call Shawn Kapusinsky a late bloomer. In the seventh grade, he was already a varsity athlete, a member of the golf team at North Rockland High School. It was just the start of a long and varied career as a varsity athlete.

He was so accomplished that at the end of his second golf season, he became North Rockland's first-ever eighth grader to be selected to the All-County first team. He finished that season undefeated in Rockland County individual match play.

Also as an eighth grader, he added a second varsity sport, joining the varsity tennis team. And it just kept getting better.

Five-Year Reign in Golf

For five seasons, right through to senior year, Shawn was the Red Raiders' top golfer, a five-time first team All-County selection and a four-time All-Section selection.

As a ninth-grade golfer, he placed second in Section 9, which covered Rockland, Orange, Ulster and Sullivan counties.

As a sophomore, he placed fifth in the New York State golf championships to go along with finishes in 13th and 8th place in two other state championship appearances.


Shawn also had a second-place finish in the South Atlantic Junior Championship, composed of the top junior golfers on the East Coast. In the process he beat both the Maryland and Virginia junior champions. Four times, Shawn won the Metropolitan Regional Qualifier for the Insurance Youth Golf Classic.

As a junior, Shawn added winning the Section 1 Conference A Qualifier and then won the Sectional championship against Section 1, including Rockland and Westchester.

As a senior he was one of three golfers statewide to qualify for the National Insurance Youth Golf Classic, which pits the top three youth golfers from each state against each other.

Shawn also has a Metropolitan Golf Assoc. Junior Summer League championship to his credit.

Along the way, Shawn reaped the benefit of having two legendary coaches, Joe D'Auria and Ralph Cordisco, both of whom are enshrined in the Rockland County Sports Hall of Fame.



"It was a pleasure coaching Shawn because he was very teachable and had a great concentration level and a positive attitude," Coach D'Auria wrote in supporting Shawn's nomination. "Shawn was the best golfer I coached at North Rockland High School," he added.

A Man for All Seasons

What's just as remarkable as Shawn's golf success is his athletic versatility. Shawn won six varsity letters in golf but added another five as a skier and four more from eighth to 11th grades competing in doubles on the tennis team.

On the ski slopes, Shawn was selected to the All-League and All-Section 1 ski teams as a junior and won two ski meets as a senior. In addition to his slalom and giant slalom racing, Shawn competed in freestyle moguls at Gore Mountain and Smuggler's Notch where he took first place.

In his senior year at North Rockland, Shawn was honored by selection as a Journal-News Scholar-Athlete of the Week in recognition of his athletic prowess, membership in the National Honor Society and participation with Varsity Athletes Against Substance Abuse.

Naturally enough, Shawn continued swinging his clubs for three golf seasons at Penn State University, where he earned a B.S. in secondary education in biology and general science in 1991. Two years later he earned his master's in environmental sciences from CCNY.

Paying It Forward

It's also no surprise that sports remain a thread running through his life as a parent, teacher and coach.

Shawn and his wife, Chandra, who is also a teacher, live in Tomkins Cove where they raised their three now-adult children – Carly, 23, Jamie, 19, and son Logan, 17.

Just as his father, Gerry Kapusinsky did, Shawn taught his children to golf, ski and play tennis. All three attended North Rockland High School and became outstanding scholar athletes in their own right. All three captained their Red Raider teams – Carly, tennis and golf; Jamie, tennis and skiing; and Logan, baseball.

By virtue of his long career in teaching and coaching, Shawn has shared both his athletic skills, knowledge and passion with countless students. During his more than three decades as a biology and AP environmental science teacher at Spring Valley High School, he has also coached both the boys' and girls' golf teams there. He also served as the varsity coach for the North Rockland High School boys' and girls' ski teams. Shawn also served as assistant golf pro at the U.S.

Military Academy golf course at West Point and at the Philip Rotella Memorial Golf Course, where he conducted clinics for youth golfers.

In the process, Shawn has emphasized the value of both golf and skiing as sports that provide a lifetime of recreation, fun and fitness.

Throughout his adult years, Shawn has also devoted himself to his students, local families and community organizations. He coached in Stony Point Little League, the North Rockland Soccer Association and CYO, volunteered with Cub Scouts and Girl Scouts and participated in drug awareness seminars, Elks Club programs for underprivileged youth and various charity drives.

Shawn is the third member of the Kapusinsky family to earn enshrinement into the Rockland County Sports Hall of Fame. His father, Gerry, was inducted in 1996 and his uncle, Hank, was inducted in 1987.

RAMAPO HIGH SCHOOL CLASS OF 1983

Kimberly McDole-Gordon forged a legacy as one of the greatest jumpers and sprinters in Rockland track & field history. She excelled in the jumps, sprints and relays while representing Kakiat Junior High, Spring Valley and Ramapo high schools, and the University of Houston.

Kim first served notice of her jumping prowess as a freshman at Spring Valley with a New York State indoor championship in the long jump. After transferring to Ramapo as a sophomore, she continued to shine for three more years. She finished second in the State long jump in both the 1981 indoor and 1982 outdoor seasons, losing the latter by a single inch.

Kim's senior year, 1983, proved to be one for the history books. She won her second State title in the long jump, spanning 19 feet, 9½ inches to set a New York State outdoor record. That mark still ranked in the top 10 all-time statewide as recently as 2010. The 1983 State outdoor championship meet was a double coronation for Kim, as she added the 100-meter dash crown to the long jump title. She was the first Rockland girl to win two individual events at a single spring State meet, a feat that has been duplicated by only two others (Jen Clayton of Suffern won three, Katelyn Tuohy of North Rockland, two.)

Relay Magic

Sprint relays were another ideal outlet for Kim's speed and competitiveness. Along with Ramapo teammates Debbie Grant (a fellow Rockland Hall of Famer), Suzette Francois and other notables, she ran on two New York State championship 4x400-meter relay teams, in the 1982 spring and 1983 winter seasons. Kim also contributed to two second-place and two third-place State medalist relay units for the Gryphons, in the 4x100 and 4x200.

That talented group of Ramapo relay sprinters is being honored next month with induction into the Rockland County Track & Field Hall of Fame in the Girls' Relay category. Kim was an individual inductee in the inaugural class of the Track Hall of Fame in 2004.



Starring at Loucks, Penn Relays, Junior Nationals

The Loucks Games also served as a showcase for Kim's amazing leaping ability. She thrived on the White Plains long jump runway, taking first place her freshman and senior years, and second and third in her sophomore and junior seasons, respectively. Kim also found great success as a senior at the prestigious Penn Relays in Philadelphia with a second-place finish.

After the high school season had concluded, Kim demonstrated her proficiency on the national stage. At the U.S. Junior National championships at Penn State, she finished second to Clair Connor of Rahway, N.J. However, she later defeated Connor to win the long jump in a summer international meet among American, Canadian and Italian junior athletes. She also finished second in a similar three-way international meet that summer.

Team Championships, All-Time Rankings

Closer to home, Kim helped Ramapo to three straight Section 9 outdoor titles (1981-83) and a pair of Rockland County outdoor championships (1982-83). Her Ramapo quartet's 4x100-meter relay time of 48.1 remained the County record for 27 years and now ranks No. 4 all-time. Her 19-9.5 distance stood as the County record in the outdoor long jump for 26 years and currently rates No. 2 all-time. Her 19-3 indoor long jump was a County record for 18 years and now stands No. 3 all-time.

Kim was coached by Betsy Evans at Spring Valley and by Jim Pollard and Matt Mulligan at Ramapo.

At Houston, a top-tier NCAA Division I program, Kim just missed 20 feet with a 19-11.75. She placed fourth in the Southwest Conference indoor meet, and scored highly in several other major invitationals.

Kim, who is 57, lives in Spring Valley and works as director of medical records at Oakland Rehabilitation & Healthcare Center in Oakland, N.J. She also serves as jumps coach for the Dominican University track team and has been a Rockland County track & field official for 14 years, giving back to the sport and offering support and expert technical guidance to local jumpers.

Kim has three children: Kaylyn Gordon, 26, a two-time New York State triple jump champion while at Ramapo; Trevon, 25; and Trevonafaith, 20.

CLASS of 1973

Jim Scaringe so excelled as a three-sport athlete that in his senior year at Tappan Zee High School he was captain of the football, wrestling and baseball teams.

As a senior during the 1972 football season, Jim was so dominant that he was honored as the New York All-State second-team defensive end. That came on top of being honored as First Team All-Rockland County defensive end.

If you think Jim was coasting along on the other side of the line of scrimmage, that was hardly the case as he took All-Rockland County 1972 honorable mention at offensive tight end.

A season earlier, as a junior, Jim was second-team All-Rockland defensive end. Obviously, he didn't rest on his laurels.

Jim was also a tough opponent on the wrestling mat, taking second place in the 1973 Section 9 wrestling championships.

In the spring of his senior year, Jim had a superlative season on the baseball diamond. He earned first-team honors on the 1973 All-Rockland County baseball team and topped that with being chosen as the first baseman on the New York Daily News First-Team Tri-State baseball team.

On the whole, Jim's senior year won him recognition as Tappan Zee High School's Athlete of the Year for 1973.

Jim's athletic career continued after graduation.

Testing the Collegiate Gridiron

Jim went on to West Virginia University where he played football as a "walk-on" for legendary head coach Bobby Bowden, who had already helped West Virginia neighbor Marshall University in rebuilding its football program after a tragic 1970 plane crash and would go on to turn Florida State into a decades-long power.

"After 'spring ball,' I was offered a full athletic scholarship but decided not to sign," Jim says. "Instead, I transferred to Nassau Community College and played football there for two years and graduated with an associate degree in December 1976."

He finished his undergraduate studies at East Stroudsburg State College in Pennsylvania. He played one season of football there and graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in psychology in the spring of 1978.



A Career in Social Work

The same passion and drive for excellence exhibited during his high school athletic exploits carried over to Jim's career choices.

After graduation, Jim worked for two years at New York Hospital's psychiatric division, where he was employed as a mental health worker on its adolescent unit. "My experience at the hospital convinced me," Jim reflects, "that I had found my calling in working with kids with emotional and behavioral issues."

To progress professionally, Jim decided to go back to graduate school. He was accepted into an advanced placement program at the University of Alabama School of Social Work, earning a master's degree in the spring of 1980.

While at Alabama, Jim recalls, "I was able to have my competitive needs met (while at the same time meeting quite a few 'characters of interest') by playing inside center on the university rugby club. I even got to meet Coach Bear Bryant," one of the few coaches who could earn billing over Bobby Bowden.

Jim returned to upstate New York for a job as the school social worker at a private residential school for developmentally and emotionally challenged children.

"While living in the middle of nowhere had its charm," Jim says, he wanted to return to a more urban setting and jumped at an opportunity to stay with friends in Boston.

He decided to look for work in the Boston area and, he says, "the rest is history."

Jim quotes Joe Walsh: "Life's been good to me so far."

He's been living and working in the Boston area for the past 41 years. "I worked for 33 years for the Boston Public Schools at a school for emotionally and behaviorally challenged students – the kids who were kicked out of

all the other public-school programs," he says. "While there, my career path arced full circle. I started out as a social worker/guidance advisor; I then became an assistant principal; then (believe it or not) the principal of the school for eight years before returning to the social work job I loved best." In 2007, Jim was selected as one of the City of Boston's "Educators of the Year." He retired from Boston Public Schools in 2015.

FAMELLETTE

ROCKLAND COMMUNITY COLLEGE COACH/PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Joe Famellette is a highly deserving recipient for the Joseph Holland Lifetime Achievement Award. He served Rockland Community College with distinction for 50 years and made an indelible impression on RCC's athletics program.

Coach Famellette was fresh out of Springfield College when RCC Athletic Director Ed Greene hired him as a physical education instructor. Joe was hired part-time in the fall of 1960, RCC's second year, to coach the first soccer team, and he became full-time in the spring. He first coached soccer and wrestling, and later added men's tennis, bowling, golf, women's basketball and women's volleyball. He also started the women's tennis program and designed a personal fitness course. Appropriately, the college's fitness lab is named in his honor.

Joe attained the title of professor of physical education and was one of the longest-serving faculty members in RCC history, retiring in 2010 after a half-century with the college. His teams won more than 10 Mid-Hudson Conference and Region XV championships. The first regional championship was in men's bowling. Thereafter, Joe had exceptional success coaching the Hawks' tennis teams. The men's tennis team won five conference titles and two regional crowns while posting undefeated seasons in 1968, 1973 and 1976. The women's team won the regionals and was undefeated in 1981. Spanning 20-plus years, RCC individuals or teams qualified for and played in eight NJCAA national tennis tournaments. Joe also coached nine All-America athletes, five in soccer and four in wrestling.

Giving Back to RCC, SUNY Orange

Joe and his wife, Judy, who is deceased, started three scholarship funds for RCC students: the Heinz Ahlmeyer USMC Scholarship, the Jerry Donnellan Veterans Scholarship, and the Joseph and Judith Dryer Famellette Scholarship. The latter scholarship is awarded to incoming students who maintain a high academic standing and participate on an RCC athletic team.

Joe was also involved in charity work for the RCC Foundation.

At SUNY Orange County Community College, from which he graduated in 1958, Joe co-funds a \$500 scholarship, the



Joseph and Judith E. Dryer Famellette and Thea D. Fry Scholarship, awarded to an entering student who played varsity sports, and is a nursing major or a veteran with demonstrable financial need. [Judy Dryer Famellette taught biology at Suffern High School and RCC.]

Joe was inducted into the RCC Sports Hall of Fame in 2010, and into the SUNY Orange CC Hall of Fame in 2018. At SUNY Orange, Joe was named the college's Athlete of the Year in 1958 after participating in tennis, wrestling and basketball. He went on to earn bachelor's and master's degrees in physical education at Springfield College.

Joe had served in the U.S. Marine Corps from 1953 to 1956 before embarking on his post-secondary education. He started in the engineering program at SUNY Orange but later switched to physical education. His first position in education was as a student-teacher at Suffern High School, prior to his arrival at RCC.

A Lifetime of Fitness Pursuits

Joe has prided himself on maintaining healthy fitness throughout his life, both for recreational and competitive pursuits. In 1995, he competed for Team USA in the World Biathlon Championships in Mexico. In 2008, he and his partner placed fourth at the National Senior Olympics. He remained an avid and successful runner, cyclist, racquetball and squash player well into his 70s. Joe, who turns 89 in August 2023, has lost his sight and, since a recent bout with Covid, walks at a slower pace. He was continuing to work

out three times a week at a local fitness center until the gym suspended operations due to the coronavirus outbreak. He makes use of a manual treadmill at home to stay active.

Joe received a diagnosis of multiple myeloma, a form of bone cancer, in 2016 and underwent a stem-cell transplant operation in February of that year at Montefiore Medical Center in the Bronx. He began to receive regular immune therapy infusions at White Plains Hospital. In 2021 Joe contracted Covid and received effective medication to arrest the illness. At the same time, his bone cancer became inactive and has remained so. He is now off the cancer medication and undergoes checkups to monitor his condition.

Joe lives with his life partner, Thea Fry, in their home in Katonah in northern Westchester County. [The land was once the ox lot of the John Jay Homestead.] Joe's four children all attended RCC.

A special congratulations to Joe Famellette.

For thirty years we were colleagues in the RCC PE department, partners and competitors on the racquet sports courts, running mates on those 6-8 workout runs, but most of all great friends.

HONORING A FOUNDER


George "Doc" Leitner was a physician and one of the earliest founders and supporters of Nyack Hospital. In April 2022, he was inducted into the Rockland County Sports Hall of Fame as the first Rocklander to play for Major League Baseball (MLB). Dr. Leitner had pitched for the Indianapolis Hoosiers of the National League during the 1887 season. He died in 1937 at age 71. Last month his great-granddaughters, Karen Leitner and Debbie Frey, bequeathed his induction plaque to Montefiore Nyack Hospital. The recognition plaque now has a home in the Hospital's historical archive and museum of artifacts located in the anterior vestibule near The Hematology and Oncology Center off Midland Avenue. We thank the Leitner family for sharing this piece of Rockland County's history with us.


